**Get Ten Years**

At Peel Assizes at Brampton last week, John May, of Orangeville, who had pleaded guilty to the charge of attempted murder, was sentenced to ten years in Kingston penitentiary by Mr. Justice Master. Last March May robbed the till of the Queen's Hotel, Brampton, and was backing out, gun in hand, when Richard Robson, the landlord, tried to stop him. With the muzzle of the revolver against Robson's stomach, May pulled the trigger. A miss fire saved Robson's life. May was captured after a running fight. Murray Sharp was acquitted of manslaughter and criminal negligence in driving his car on the Toronto-Hamilton highway. There was a collision and Miss Laura Van Looven, of Toronto, died from injuries she received.
