Mr. Fisher's Meeting
There was a good attendance at the public meeting in the interests of Mr. W. F. Fisher, the Liberal candidate for Halton, in the town hall here last evening.
Leave Dale occupied the chair and after few introductory remarks in which he spoke in glowing terms of the candidate as an honorable gentleman worthy of the support of the electors, he introduced the speakers of the evening.
Mr. Pearson was the first speaker and she proved herself an able exponent of woman's rights in the political field. She criticized the Union Government, the Meighen and Creer platforms and explained to the ladies the reasons why in her opinion the Liberal candidate should receive their support.
Mr. Fisher followed. He referred to the three parties in the field as the U.F.O., the L.O.U. and Liberals. He criticized the Government for accepting money from the Burdon Corporation in lieu of cash for taxes while the smaller concerns and individuals were compelled to pay in hard cash. The government had not kept faith with the people and failed their promise. There were no three parties when the Liberals were in power because they represented the common people as well as other classes. The extravagance of the government was a more serious question than the tariff. He had only consented to be a candidate on the understanding that he would not be bound to any leader or any policy but would support any measure he thought in the best interests of the country. He was in favor of a tariff for revenue and one that would also give sufficient protection to all legitimate industries of the country. There were companies that had exploited their position to the full extent and had taken the money from the people to amass millions of dollars which they would not give back to the country. The tariff should be revised to make it easier for the little fellow and cause the big fellows to carry more load. If the Liberals are elected to power they will support any measure he thought in the best interests of the country. He was a farmer and had always been one. The country is wonderful and productive. Take Them at Their Word

Mr. Meighen and his friends say that the tariff is the only issue in this election. That is not true, but if it were, the Government could not afford to be judged by its record on the tariff. Its failure is confessed. The publicity bureau of the Conservative party says that there is "evidence of stagnation, instability, unemployment and lack of confidence." That reminds us of the gloomy conditions prevailing in 1896, after 18 years of Conservative administration. Then came the 16 Liberal years of progress and prosperity. We give Conservative testimony as to that record. The Liberal Government was defeated in September 1911. The Honorable Conservative Government then came into power and in November of the same year prepared the speech from the throne, which contained these words:
"It affords me great pleasure to congratulate you upon the continued and increasing prosperity of the country. Our trade both with British and foreign countries is rapidly extending and there is every prospect that its volume in the present year will be largely in excess of that attained at any time in the past."
Mr. now Sir Thomas White became Minister of Finance. He too was impressed by the abundant prosperity existing at the close of the fifteen years of Liberal administration, and he frankly testified to it at that time in these remarkable words:
"It will, as I have said before, be gratifying to all that the material prosperity with which we have been so highly favored still continues to be our portion. Despite the serious vicissitudes through which the Western wheat crop has passed and the unusual heat experienced in the Province of Ontario during the past summer, the field crops of Canada show a bountiful yield, and with the high prices prevailing for practically all its products the great basic industry of agriculture continues in a flourishing condition. Almost every department of trade and commerce shows expansion. Our mines are wonderfully productive. Our coat fisheries notably the Atlantic, have enjoyed a good catch and high prices. Our manufacturers are thriving and new industries are springing up throughout the whole Dominion. Railway construction, especially in the West, proceeds apace, preparing

a way for settlement in districts not yet opened up and for trade with other markets than we now enjoy. Our increased bank deposits, clearings and circulation, the amount of public and private building, evidenced in municipal and business structures, extensions to the country, all attest that the general prosperity of Canada at the present time is very great."
This was the handsome testimony given in 1911 by a Conservative Minister of Finance, an acknowledged master of his subject, to the work of his Liberal predecessors, and especially of Mr. Fielding, one of the leading men of the Liberal Party to day, whose experience and knowledge will undoubtedly be used in the framing of the new tariff.
Mr. White went on to say that Canada continued to be the land of promise for the homeseeker, immigrants coming in at the rate of thousands a day and labor conditions good. The future of Canada he said looked bright indeed.
Now after another period of Conservative rule, the Conservative literature comes out with a doleful wail about stagnation, instability, unemployment and lack of confidence, and the Toronto Telegram mentions over the exodus of over 800,000 Canadians to the United States in 10 years. Canadians are apparently rushing to take trains out of Canada to escape the consequences of Conservative rule. It may be that our Conservative friends are taking too gloomy a view. Doomed themselves to defeat, they imagine that the whole country is heading for disaster. If they are telling the truth or anything near the truth, it is surely time for a change.
