Of Indian Strife

Two Dozen Skeletons Discovered

Fans in Excavated

What is believed to be an Indian battle site was discovered last Thursday by Sidney Mountain on his farm, on 8rd line in Esqueville, Homestead, which has been in the Turner family for over one hundred years.

Mr. Mountain was plowing some new ground when the plow hit a large mass of earth, the bottom of which was covered with the remains of a large Indian skull.

Digging operations began at once and in a short time over two dozen Indian skeletons were unearthed, all lying in a circle around the first skull found.

Another was dug up later, several tomahawks, a lot of wampum, arrowheads, shells and beads were also discovered. Operations will be continued in order to make further discoveries.

from the United States and they would get the money, whereas if manufactured in Canada, we would get the goods and money too.

He pointed out that if the tariff barriers are removed, as was advocated by both Mr. Crean and Mr. King, it would open the Canadian market to the flooding of American-made goods and would practically put our own Canadian industries out of business, making it impossible to compete with them, as they manufactured on a much larger scale and could therefore sell a little cheaper with a free market.

He pleaded for a tariff of adequate and moderate protection, a tariff which protects and encourages the industries of one which will continue the prosperity of the country in the best interests of farmer, manufacturer and laborer alike.

At the conclusion of the speech, a beautiful bouquet was presented by the chairman, the Hon. J. H. Lawler, who is the oldest lawyer in the province.

Besides the speakers and other men other citizens on the platform were Col. Brown, Mr. Plock, H. Corke, J. B. Markwick, G. M. Arnold, W. V. Grant and N. Cummings.

The meeting closed with singing the National Anthem and three cheers for the King and Dr. Anderson.
