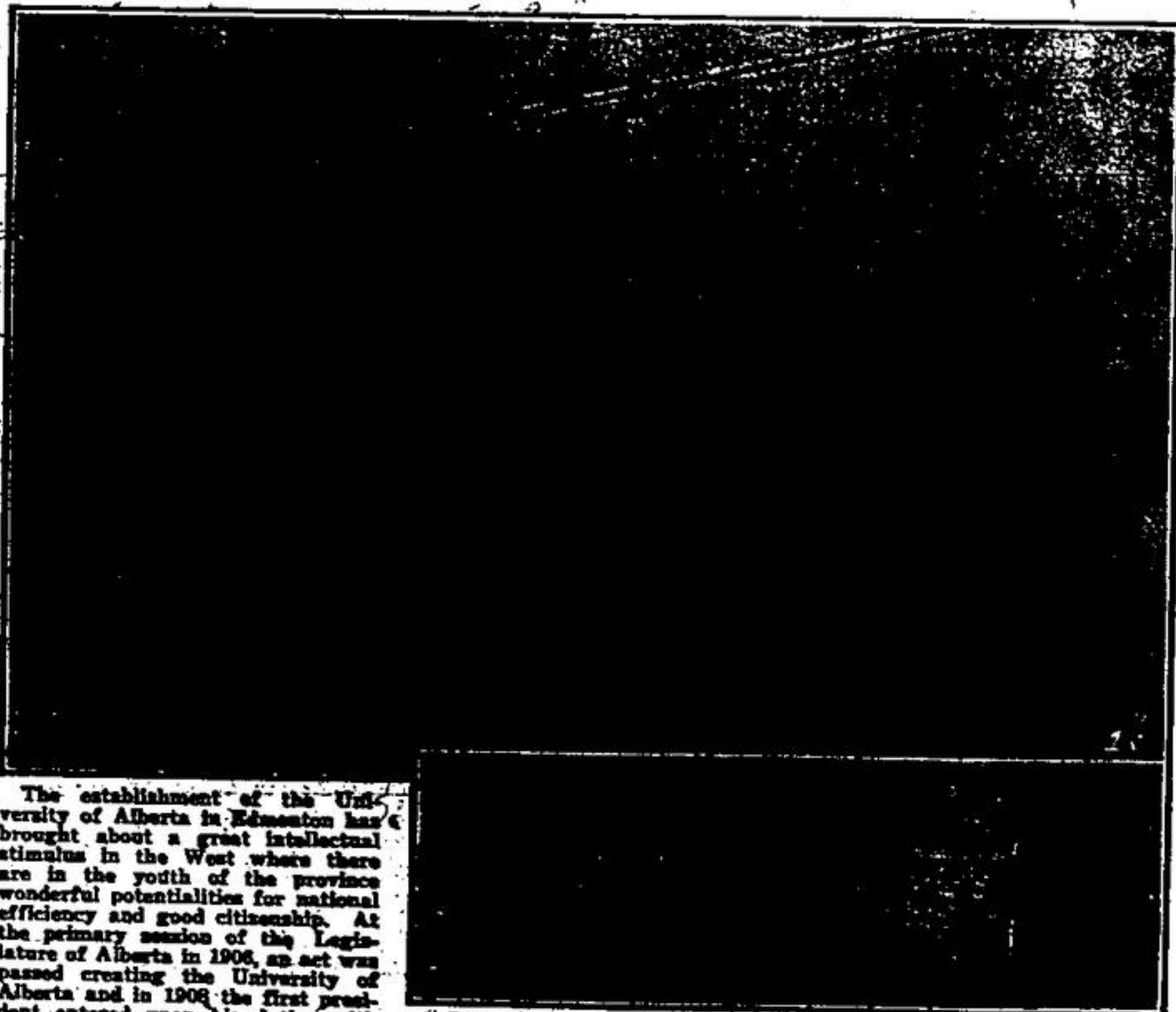

## The University of Alberta



The establishment of the University of Alberta in Edmonton has brought about a great intellectual stimulus in the West where there are in the youth of the province wonderful possibilities for national efficiency and good citizenship. At the primary session of the Legislature of Alberta in 1906, an act was passed creating the University of Alberta and in 1908 the first president entered upon his duties with inaugurations beginning in September of last year.

The site of the University on the high banks of the Saskatchewan in South Edmonton comprises 268 acres with there is also a farm of 800 acres. Five hundred acres are under cultivation in addition to those covered by buildings. The institution is financed by the government and the expenditure to date amounts to three and one-half million dollars. There are three commodious residential buildings—Athabasca Hall, Assiniboia Hall and Pembina Hall, providing residential accommodation for four hundred students. The main teaching building is a handsome structure of two-chassis style and was opened for classes in the fall of 1915. The new medical building which will be completed for the opening of the fall session marks as one of the finest in Canada. It forms the southern part of a quadrangle of University buildings and is an architectural harmony with the other structures. In addition to accommodations for the department of chemistry, it contains laboratories for the department of anatomy, physiology, pathology and public health. There are two lecture halls, in the first of which are two hundred seats, and a smaller one with a capacity for one hundred students each. Twenty-five thousand dollars, representing the laboratory and library, has been made available for the medical faculty by the Rockefeller Foundation, for the

Under the direction of the Extension Board, the farm young people of Alberta were given a week of work and play at the University in the Summer School for teachers which is carrying on its sixth program of work. "Dewdrops and Gold," the year book of the activities of the year which are as interesting as they are broad in scope. The Clubs include the Agricultural Club, the Pharmacy Club in its fourth year. Amateur sport in Western Canada has been developed by the University of Alberta Athletics Society. There is a track club, soccer, basketball, rugby and hockey, and great advances have been made in women's athletics. C. G.

## MORO A DANGEROUS FANATIC

Believes Eternal Bliss to Be His if He Meets Death While Killing Christians.

The psychology of Mohammedanism is incomprehensible to persons reared in the atmosphere and teachings of American Christianity. With us the separation of church and state is as much a matter of course as the air we breathe. With us "life is immoral and the killing of an unbeliever is a crime punishable with death. The Mohammedan has no conception of ecclesiastical and state law. There is only one law, the Koran; and while in fact the precept and the rule may be different persons, they are different only in a functional way, like a Judge and an executive in our government. The religious ruler is the same ruler, as was Mohammed in his day. The killing of Christians is a virtue that merits everlasting bliss in paradise. The martyr of the faithful Christian is held in higher esteem than the humble, ignorant Mohammedan peasant who never hesitates to give his life for his religion and devote his lives to killing Christians. Mohammedans who have sworn to kill Christians are called in the Philippines "jihadists," from the Spanish, meaning one who has sworn or taken an oath. Up to a decade ago it was an uncommon occurrence in Java for a fanatic to cut off his hair, shave, or kris, in a basket of fruit until he had passed the guard of the gate of the walled town, then throw his blade and cut right and left, killing men, women or child, with perfect impartiality, until a bullet from the guard stopped his advance. ## HAVE TO WAIT TO UNLOAD

Shipping Congestion at London Docks Said to Be of an Extraordinary Character.

A writer to the London Times describes the Victoria and Albert docks at Tilbury as being "clogged to their fullest capacity with big ships," many of which "look absolutely dead for the simple reason that they can not be unloaded because there is nowhere to put their cargoes." Of ships carrying Australian wheat it is said to be "a common thing to wait anything up to a month for a berth and to its another month tied up against the wharf, unloading and re-loading." Inefficiency of labor is in a large measure responsible for the discharging output per shift of 13 men in a nine-hour day has been reduced from 100 to 63 tons. The cause is partly the loss of many good men in the war, partly loading on the job to make work for as many men as possible. Congestion of the ports is attributed to state control over essential imports, to state control over railroads, and to reduction of the hours of labor. By these means the carrying power of ships has been reduced at least 20 per cent below pre-war standards.

## Real Neighbors

An interesting experiment in neighborliness has been carried on for nearly a year in a part of Toledo which is populated almost exclusively by Polish immigrants and their descendants. The Polish Business Men's club of the district conceived the idea that the newly Polish families in the community should be taken care of in a neighborly way, rather than by charity organizations. The latter were requested not to extend aid in the district, but to notify the club, so that it might meet all emergencies. This is not done from the club treasury, however. An investigation is made to determine whether the need is for money, supplies or work, and the other residents of the block, including the tradesmen, are then informed that their neighbors need their assistance, which the club reports, is always forthcoming.

## Immunity From Whooping Cough

Dr. T. Luzzati of Rome was called to three different homes, in each of which a child had begun to cough. In each case he suspected that it might be whooping cough; therefore, as a precaution, he vaccinated all the brothers and sisters with an anti-whooping-cough serum. Ten days later his suspicion was confirmed by the typical whoop, but in no case did one of the other children catch the disease, though no attempt at isolation was made.

## Curing Intolerance of Milk

Dr. Genegrier reports to the French Pediatrics society that a newly born infant which could not take milk in any form was cured by three subcutaneous injections, one every other day, of 8, 16 and 30 minims of sterilized cow's milk. The third injection was followed by violent vomiting and rigors, but from this moment the baby tolerated milk by the mouth in progressive doses, beginning with five and ending with 250 grams a day.

## National Amities

England will return to the state of Kentucky a flag which was captured from Kentucky volunteers at the battle of the Thames in Michigan in the war of 1812. The Kentucky legislature has appropriated money to send to England a commissioner who will bring back the flag. This commissioner, James Buchanan of Louisville, is a descendant of the commander of the Kentucky troops in the battle.
