

presenting of better medical training in the United States and Canada.

Dr. H. M. Fury, M.A., is president of the University of Alberta in 1921, an act was passed in 1920. The University of Alberta and in 1908 the first president entered upon his duties with the beginning in September of that year.

The site of the University, on the high banks of the Saskatchewan River, is a spacious campus of 220 acres, with buildings and grounds under cultivation in addition to those covered by buildings. The institution is free to the government and the expenditure is to the tune of three and one-half million dollars.

There are three cosmopolitan residential halls and a Peacock Hall, providing residential accommodation for four hundred students. The main building is a handsome structure of red-brick and stone and was opened for classes in the fall of 1916. The new medical building which was completed for the opening of the fall session is one of the finest in Canada. It forms the northern part of a quadrangle of University buildings. It is an architectural masterpiece with its Gothic structures. In addition to accommodating the department of chemistry, it contains laboratories for the departments of anatomy, physiology, pathology and public health. There are two lecture halls, in theatre form with capacity for 2000 students.

Two lecture halls, in theatre form with capacity for 2000 students, are provided for the departments of agriculture, economics, and commerce.

The Scientific Association has a definite program of economic research and the resources of the province are available for this purpose. The Agricultural Experiment Station is conducting an experimental station for agricultural research.

The library of nineteen thousand volumes has been collected by books written by Canadian authors on Canada and is located in the main building.

The Scientific Association has covered the various fields of literary endeavor of value in such a small province as Alberta.

An amateur sportsman in Western Canada has developed by the University of Alberta Athletics Society. There is a track club, soccer, basketball team, tennis, swimming, archery, and great advance has been made in women's athletics.—G. G.

### MORO A DANGEROUS FANATIC

Believes Eternal Bliss to Be His if He Meets Death While Killing Christians.

The psychology of Mohammedanism is incomprehensible to persons reared in the atmosphere and teachings of American Christianity. With us the separation of church and state is a matter of course as the air we breathe. With us sacrifice is immoral and the killing of an unbeliever is a crime punishable with death. The Mohammedans, however, have only one law, the Koran; and while in fact the priest and the ruler may be different persons, they are different only in a functional way, like a Judge and an executioner in our government. The spiritual leader of a temporal power, as was Mohammed, is in both. The killing of Christians is a virtue that merits everlasting bliss in paradise. The martyrs of the early Christian church burned with no more consuming ardor than the humble, ignorant Moslems who have sacrificed their wives, their children, their slaves, their friends and devote their lives to killing Christians. Mohammedans who have sworn to kill Christians are called "In the Philippines Juramentados, from the Spanish, meaning 'those who have sworn to kill'—and are said to be 'the perfect impenitent, until a bullet from the guard stopped his advances.' It was this indomitable will to kill that gave the Christian Filipinos their mortal fear of the Moro in times past.—G. Garfield Jones, in Asia.

### HAVE TO WAIT TO UNLOAD

Shipping Congestion at London Docks Said to Be of an Extraordinary Character.

A writer to the London Times describes the Victoria and Albert docks at Tilbury as being "a shell filled entirely with big ships," many of which "look absolutely dead for the simple reason that they can not be unloaded because there is nowhere to put their cargoes." Of ships carrying Australian meat it is said to be "a common sight to see a ship loaded a month for a berth and to see another month tied up against the wharf, unloading and reloading." Inefficiency of labor is to a large degree responsible, for the average discharging output per ship is only 100 tons a day, having been reduced from 200 to 100 tons, because is partly the loss of many good men in the port, partly loading on the job to make work for as many men as possible. Congestion of the ports is attributed to state control over essential imports, to state control over railroads, to failure to end the house of labor. By these means the carrying power of ships has been reduced at least 30 per cent below pre-war standards.

**Real Neighbors?**  
An interesting experiment in neighborhood has been tried out, for nearly a year in a part of Toledo which is populated almost exclusively by Polish immigrants and their descendants. The Polish Business Men's Club of the district conceived the idea that the newly Polish families in the community should be taken care of in a neighborly way, rather than in charitable organizations. The latter were required not to extend aid in the district, but to notify the club, so that it might meet all emergencies. This is not done from the club treasury, however. An investigation is made to determine whether the people are fit to receive help, and the other residents of the block, including the tradesmen, are then informed that their neighbors need their assistance, which, the club reports, is always forthcoming.

**Immunity From Whooping Cough.**  
Dr. T. Luxall of Rome was called to three different houses, in each of which a child had begun to cough. In each case he diagnosed what might be whooping cough; therefore, after a prescription, he vaccinated all the brothers and sisters with an anti-wheezing serum. Ten days later his sample was confirmed by the typical whoop, but in no case did one of the other children contract the disease, though no attempt at isolation was made.

In reporting this, Dr. Luxall says he has found no benefit from vaccination once the disease has become pronounced;

**Curing Intolerance of Milk.**  
Dr. Georgeier reports to the French Academy society that a newly born infant which could not take milk in any form was cured by three successive injections, one every other day, of 8, 16 and 32 mils of sterilized cow's milk. The third injection was followed by violent vomiting and rigors, but from this moment the baby tolerated milk by the mouth in progressive doses, beginning with five and ending with 250 grains a day.

**National Amencies.**  
England will return to the state of Kentucky a flag which was captured under the direction of the Executive Board, the famous regiment of Kentucky volunteers at the battle of the Thames in Michigan in the war of 1812. The Kentucky legislature voted \$10,000 to send the flag to England to commission it to be sent back to the flag. This commissioner, James Buchanan of Louisville, is a descendant of the commander of the Kentucky troops in the battle.
