

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THE GREAT LAKES

Mountains, Plains and Valleys Exis Under Water. The mysterious disappearance is Lake Superior, during recent years, of many vessels, never afterward heard of, has cause mariners to make a study of that sheet of water,

fo locate submerged and uncharted Not very long ago the magnificent steam yacht of William L. Harkness, a Standard Oil multi-millionaire, ran dpon one of these rocks, a "pinnacle" rising to within five feet of the sur-Tace, and sank, though all on board

with numerous soundings, in order

were saved. .The water area of the five great lakes, taken together, is equal to that of the Mediterranean. Lake Superor, the largest of them, is a veritable fresh-water sea, covering 31,200 square iniles, with 1,500 miles of shore line and a maximum depth of 1.008 feet.

Strange though it may seem only 20,000 years ago the Great Lakes did not exist. A mighty-river, an upper extension of the Str Lawrence. flowed from the neighborhood of Du-e futh southeastward to what is now. Lake Ontario, thouce pouring through the present valley of the bank was the present highlands along the north shore of Lake Huron, and its bouth bank was a high nidge which now runs (aubmerged); across Lake Haron in a southeasterly direction, rising 400 feet above the general level of the bottom. Since that early day all that re-

gion has been slowly tilted toward the southwest, the north end of Lake-Michigan being uplifted and the south and correspondingly depressed. As a result of this goologie change the greater St. Lawrence ceased to flow, being unable to reach Lake Ontario on account of the altered level, and the waters thus impounded spread over the surroundcountry, forming the Great

The water dammed up in this way sought the lowest levels in the landscape, and the biggest hole became Lake Superior. Lake Erie is shallowest-a flat plain not much below the level of the surrounding land, except for a marked depression di-

If one could take a sponge the size of the moon, soak up with it all the water in the Great Lakes, and, squeeze it out into the Atlantic Ocean, it would be found that the floor of Lake Ontario is a broad val-Toy continuous with the St. Lawrence Valley, having a breadth of thirty to forty miles and bounded on the south side by precipitous clius. The floor of Lake Huron would present the appearance of a plain with a range of hills (already mentioned) running across it from northwest to southeast. To the southwest of this range is now the shallow part

of the lake; the deep part-is northeast of the range It would be found that the floor of Lake Michigan is divided into two basins, separated by a high plateau across the middle, the northern part being considerably deeper .nen the

Williams Jnt., has made a collec-tion o addian relics found in Norfolk Conty. Their interest is in their workmanship, the most highly finished filmts of the continent being those found on the north shore of Lake Erie. The Attiwandaron, who, until their extinction in 1650-1651 by the Mohawks, dwelt in that region, were called by the French the Neutral Nation. This was because they supplied the Hurons and Five Nations with arrowheads, and consequently remained neutral in the wars between these rival nations, writes Mr. Wil tiams in the Simcoe Reformer. Perhaps another way of looking this practice of theirs is to say that they were becoming a race of handicraftsmen rather than of hunters and fighters. 

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

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
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
