Social Surveys of the World

Rt. Hon. C. J. Doherty was Canada's representative during 1921 at the assembly of the League of Nations in Geneva. Mr. Doherty took an important part in the proceedings, both on the floor of the assembly in reference to article 10, and in committee work.

Mr. Doherty indeed was chairman of one of the six committees of the assembly, the fifth, dealing with "humanitarian" questions. The agenda for the committee included traffic in opium, deportation of women and children in Turkey, traffic in women and children, the opium campaign and international co-ordination of intellectual work.

At one of the meetings of the committee Mr. Henry Lafontaine of Belgium made a survey of the evolution and scope of the movement for the co-ordination of intellectual work.

Mr. Lafontaine is closely associated with the "Union of International Associations," with headquarters in Brussels, to secure the betterment of material conditions in intellectual work and also to develop a spirit of international union, and to encourage the co-ordination of the efforts of these associations to achieve within their own spheres that of scientific, moral, legal, economic, social and charitable movements—the organization of intellectual life upon stable and sure bases.

At Brussels there has been established a bibliography comprising twelve million titles, a collection of incalculable value to intellectual workers all over the world. The diffusion of the information thus collected presented considerable difficulty, and this had led to the establishment at Brussels of an international university.

This institution is in no way intended to compete with other universities. It provides post-graduate courses for students who have already completed their studies and who wish to take advantage of the collective learning of the professors, who, to the number of eighty-four, during the current year have assembled to give courses of lectures. It is hoped that in the future the organization will number among its members no fewer than 1,000 professors, members of universities in all parts of the world. Another objective is the fuller recognition of intellectual research, which is at present far from being recompensed or even recognized on the same terms as technical research, although it frequently occurs that the latter is inspired and brought to fruition only as the outcome of intellectual work, carried on perhaps under obscure and even penurious conditions. Capital and labor, according to Mr. Lafontaine, are not the two essential factors, as is generally supposed, but intellect must in the first place provide the impetus for all human progress and production, and thinkers have, therefore, the right to a privileged position among the workers of the world, in order that they may be in a position to render services of still greater value than those which they have already rendered.

The Belgian authority hopes that the League of Nations may be able to build upon the foundation already laid, in such a way that both the material and the intellectual resources of every country may be pooled and distributed to the mutual advantage of intellectual workers all over the world.

M. Alvarez of Chile, another member of the committee, thinks there should be standard to which students everywhere must attain in order to qualify for the pursuit of higher education. He also favors the unification of existing legislation with regard to literary property.

M. de Yanguas of Spain takes a similar view. Mlle. Bonnevie of Norway emphasizes the viewpoint that freedom is one of the most important conditions of intellectual work. Too great a degree of centralization might be dangerous, especially if it were established too hastily.

The vice-chairman of this committee on humanitarian questions, headed by Mr. Doherty, is his excellency Mr. Tang-Pai-Fou of China. Other prominent members of the committee are Mr. Malcolm Lindsay Shepherd of Australia; Count Monodoff, of Austria; Rt. Hon. A. J. Balfour, of Great Britain; Mr. Gabriel Hanotaux, of France; Rt. Hon. Sriwansa Sastri of India; Baron Kawakami of Japan; Prince Giannelli of Italy; Prince Arta-od-Dowich, of Persia; Prof. Joneco, of Roumania; His Excellency Fuwa Ehidah, Koaha of Siam; and Prof. George C. Murray, representing South Africa.

Recalls Chicago Fire. Lord Shaugnessy told a Chicago newspaper the other day that he was a child in the offices of the Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul Railway at Milwaukee, his birthplace, when the great fire of Chicago occurred just fifty years ago.

"The present Chicago fire celebration interests me," he went on, "because I was in Chicago the second day after the catastrophe when the ruins were still blazing. I had to go as far as 13th street at the time to get something to eat."
