

**Sea Serpents Really Exist.**

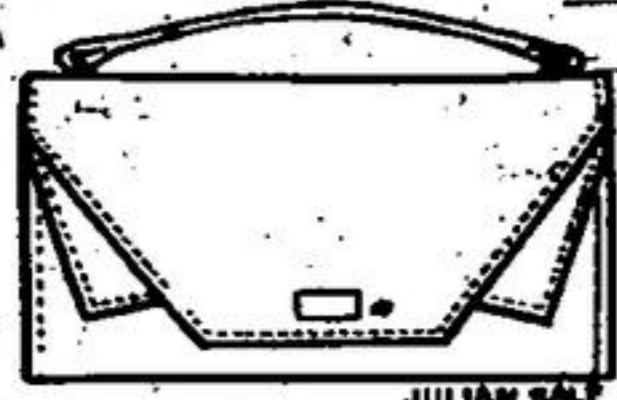
**Timely Love.**

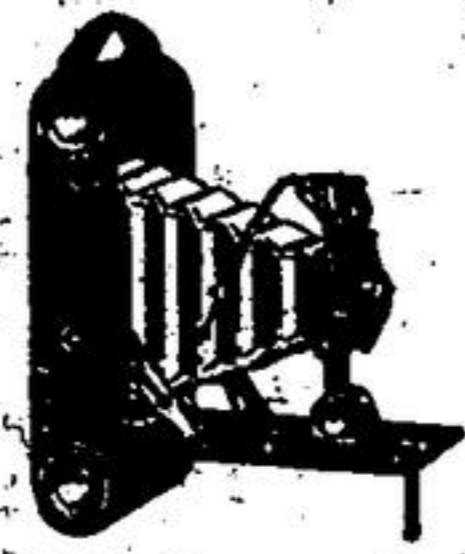

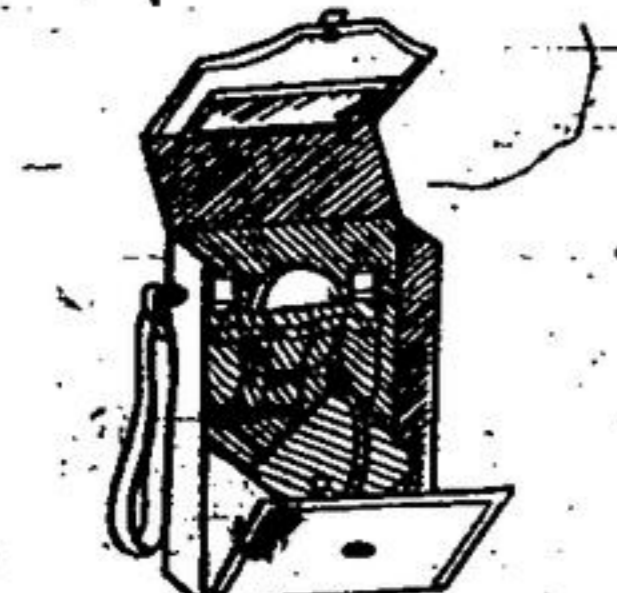
