### In The Public Eye

**J. H. McKechnie is Chief Inspector**

WE clip the following from the Regina Leader of Dec. 18th, the subject of the article being a son of Mrs. A. McKechnie, Georgetown. His father died here between four and five years ago. J. H. McKechnie, M. D. Paed. L.L.B., of Regina, has been appointed chief inspector of schools for the province, including both primary and secondary schools; it was announced yesterday by Hon. S. J. Letia, minister of education for Saskatchewan.

The chief inspectorate of public schools has been vacant for nearly a couple of years, since the resignation of Jas. Duff, who formerly held that post. Mr. McKechnie succeeds Mr. Duff and also takes over the work conducted by J. A. Snel, who has been chief inspector of high schools up to date.

Mr. McKechnie came to the province in 1907 after teaching public and high schools at various points in Ontario. He was for some time principal of the Galtville public and high schools and in 1910 was appointed a school inspector with headquarters at Wilkie and Estabrook. In 1916 he came to the Provincial Normal School in Regina as acting principal when Lieut.-Col. T. E. Perrett, the principal, went overseas. Upon Col. Perrett's return he continued at the Normal School as vice-principal up to the present time.

Mr. McKechnie has very high academic qualifications. He graduated from Queen's University with M.A. degree as a gold medalist in mathematics. A post-graduate course at Toronto University led up to the degree of Doctor of Pedagogy and subsequently he was awarded the degree of Bachelor of Laws at the University of Saskatchewan.
