At the close of the nominations Clerk Heath was elected to the chair and called on the candidates present who addressed the meeting.

Reeve Dale reviewed the statement very thoroughly and explained the various items of receipts and expenditures. He was a candidate for Mayor because he felt he should not stand in the way of others who wished to advance and also because there were certain important works in connection with the town which had been started and which he believed he could be of service to the municipality in completing. He thanked the ratepayers for their support in the past and would appreciate a continuance of their confidence. He would consider it a great honor

to be elected Mayor of Georgetown and would do his utmost in the best interests of the town. Major Grant said he was pleased to see the large gathering and the people taking an interest in public affairs. He had been a resident of town for over 40 years, and had served on Public and High School Boards and Councils. He was pleased he had lived to see Georgetown grow from a rural municipality into a town and proud to be nominated for first mayor, but could not say at present whether he would be a candidate.

Mr. L. E. Fleck said he had been urged by friends to stand for Mayor, he had served the town as Councillor, Reeve, School Trustee and on the Board of Trade, also had been Warden of County when serving as Reeve. While he considered it an honor to be Georgetown's first Mayor, he felt an older resident should have it and proposed to Reeve Dale, that they both resign and elect Major Grant by acclamation.

After considering the proposition, Reeve Dale said that as he had not been nominated for Reeve or Councillor, it meant crowding him out of the Council altogether, and in justice to his supporters he could not comply with the suggestion made by Mr. Fleck.

Speeches were also made by the following: D. McIntyre and H. H. Heartwell, candidates for the Reeve; W. C. Anthony, W. McMillan, Wm. Long, Geo. Wrigglesworth, W. Ashenhurst, Wm. Barber, George Leslie, Wm. Barclay, Wm. Bradley and J. B. Mackenzie.

Clerk Tracy was chairman of the meeting which followed and called on the different candidates to address the meeting.

Reeve Elliott reviewed the work of the year dealing with the financial statement and work in the township and also County Council affairs. There was little or no criticism and the ratepayers were evidently well satisfied with the manner in which the business of the township had been conducted.
