When moulted it is worth a penny. But when the spots on its forewings have blurred together in a black mass it is worth two guineas.

The "woolly bear" caterpillar is notable only on account of the fact that it is a weeder. But when it has chomped out into a Tiger moth it may become valuable. Again, the value depends upon the markings. When the spots are clear the specimen is worth twopence; when blurred it would be cheap at three guineas.

Most people know that the Tunic cabbage butterfly has pure white forewings tipped with jet-black. The female, on the other hand, has forewings marked with two very neat round black spots, which are a distinctive set-off to her appearance.

Specimens have been caught in which one of the forewings is plain white, and the other marked with spots. Only experts could detect the sex, but for such a specimen four guineas is no unusual price.

Common blue butterflies have their peculiarities too. Sometimes the brilliant blue of their wings is interwoven with dark, smoky-like bands. These are known as "rayed" specimens. They are of great interest to scientists, and as much as five guineas has been given for an insect which ordinarily would have been worth a penny.

Sierra Leone is the home of really valuable insects. In the past few years specimens are not found every day, there are still many kinds which fetch the lucky finders many hundreds of pounds.

These butterflies lay few eggs, and of these fewer than 50 hatch out successfully. Consequently specimens are becoming scarcer and scarcer, and their value is increasing steadily.

No one has ever counted the wing spots of these rare African moths. Even the muscles lumber between four and five thousand. They provide thrills in hunting as great as those in big-game expeditions.

Inventor of the Steamboat.

Fulton is famed as the inventor of the steamboat. At the time he was a test that he was not the inventor. In 1543 Blasco de Garay, a sea captain, of Spain, exhibited in the harbor of Barcelona, in the presence of Charles V. and his court, a steamboat capable of a speed of three miles an hour. For nearly two hundred years Blasco de Garay's invention was lost sight of, and not till the end of the eighteenth century was the subject taken up again. European scientists became interested, and the result was the construction of a steamboat on the River Saone by the Marquis de Jouffrey in 1759. In 1788 Patrick Miller, of Scotland, built a steamboat. It succeeded so well that a larger one was built in 1789, when seven miles an hour was made. Eventually Robert Fulton built the Clermont, which made its trial trip in 1808. Robert Fulton has the fame of an inventor that belongs to Blasco de Garay, who ante-dated Fulton by two hundred and sixty-five years.

Hidden in a Glacier.

It is generally known that glaciers move that at Grindelwald at a speed of about two-fifths of an inch per hour—and within the next few days an experiment will be begun that is expected to culminate 150 years hence. It is intended to throw into the crevasse of a glacier on the Gratsgussa at Pontresina a string of three brass boxes containing various documents concerning the death of three Zurich tourists who were killed at the spot last winter. The purpose is to establish the speed of the glacier movement, and it is calculated that the glacier will give up the box at the termination of its journey in about 150 to 160 years. One of the documents in the box asks the finder to send it at once to the authorities of Pontresina with details of the find.

Not by Water.

A bishop who was on a sea voyage encountered a very severe storm. The passengers were greatly alarmed, and so, too, was the bishop, who hastily convened a prayer meeting in the saloon.

When the storm had abated the skipper of the liner chaffed the bishop regarding the matter.
