**Trade Declined in Canada During  
Month of September.**  
During September, as compared  
with September of a year ago, the total  
value of Canadian trade declined  
over sixty-two millions of dollars.  
For the six months ending Septem-  
ber, in comparison with the corre-  
sponding period of the previous year,  
the decline was over half a billion  
dollars.

**Times Are Dull.**  
During September, 1921, the total  
of goods entered for consumption  
was \$59,721,003, as against \$116,  
121,558 for September, 1920. Ex-  
ports of domestic goods for Septem-  
ber, 1921, totalled \$28,283,182, as  
against \$44,389,625 for September,  
1920, and exports of foreign goods  
for September, 1921, totalled \$1,  
327,917, as against \$2,014,559 for  
September, 1920.

**A Missionary's Romance.**  
Dr. S. O. Eschoch, M.D.C.M., a Per-  
sian missionary and a graduate of  
England, has been elected an Ontario  
Canadian citizenship through a pro-  
longed absence in Persia on account  
of the war. He was in the mis-

and his wife and the other Christians in  
the town had to flee south to where the
