## Halton County Council

Following are a few extracts from the adjourned meeting of the County Council which was held last week:

Mr. Hartwell moved, seconded by Mr. Blain, that Rev. R. F. Cameron be appointed to represent this council on Georgetown High School Board for the years 1922-23-24.—Carried.

Mr. Robinson moved, seconded by Mr. Hartwell, that Alfred Billmer be and is appointed to represent this council on the Board of Education for the town of Oakville for the years 1923-24.—Carried.

Mr. Blain moved, seconded by Mr. Hartwell, that D. S. Robertson be appointed High School Trustee for the town of Milton for a term of three years, 1922-23-24.—Carried.

Mr. Betzner moved, seconded by Mr. Brockton, that Thos. Drever be appointed High School Trustee for the town of Burlington for the term of three years, 1922-23-24.—Carried.

Mr. Elliott moved, seconded by Mr. Johnston, that the Warden and Clerk be authorized to sign and submit to the Minister of Public Works and Highways of the Province of Ontario in the petition of the corporation of the county of Halton, showing that during the period January 1st, 1921 to December 31st, 1921, there has been expended on the county highway system the sum of \$284,848.88, requesting the statutory grant on that amount, as provided by the Act to Aid in the Improvement of Public Highways.—Carried.

Mr. Irving moved, seconded by Stanley Allen, that the Board of Milton be the county council's representative on the Board of Management of the Children's Shelter.—Carried.

Mr. Robinson moved, seconded by Mr. Elliott, that the annual report of Mr. J. M. Denyes, Halton Public School Inspector, be received and that the thanks of council be tendered Mr. Denyes for the clear and concise manner in which the report was compiled.—Carried.

Mr. Robinson moved, seconded by Mr. Betzner, that the printing committee procure by tender 225 copies of the Inspector's report for 1921 and that the Clerk notify the printers of the county.—Carried.


Mr. Hillmer moved, seconded by Mr. Johnston, that the council do now adjourn and meet again at the call of the Warden.—Carried.

**O.T.A. Prisoners**  
At Tuesday evening's session of Halton county council it was decided to memorialize Attorney General Haney with regard to prisoners confined in county jail for offences in connection with the Ontario Temperance Act. In the memorial it is set out that in many, if not most cases, the heavy fines, some of them from \$600 to \$1000, go wholly, if paid, to the province. In case of default the offenders go to the county jails. Sometimes the fines are paid after a month or shorter period of imprisonment, and the Government reaps the full benefit without being coming responsible for the keep of such prisoners, which the petitioners regard as an imposition. It is asked that a clause be added to the Ontario Temperance Act or the Administration of Justice Expenses Act, directing the Auditor of Accounts to classify as "Government prisoners all inmates of county jails who are serving sentences, either by default of payment of a fine or in default of payment of a fine, or in cases where the fine, if a fine be imposed, would be payable to the province, and that such amendment be retroactive.—Champion.

## What about Covered Rink?

A covered rink for Georgetown is a need that one hour discussed every day by the young people of the town and by gray headed citizens too, who are not too old to take an interest in the young folks and their welfare. This winter skaters and hockeyists have been fortunate in having the open rink, which is splendidly conducted by Mr. Geo. Adams, but we are quite sure that everybody agrees unambiguously as to the desirability of having an up-to-date rink to provide exercise and recreation for the youth of the town and sport and amusement for the public in the shape of hockey and skating. There is a splendid local material to choose from for a hockey team, and with practice, would give a hard fought battle to any team in this district, but without a rink they are handicapped. When it comes to building the form that the building should take or how it might be financed, there is considerable variability and even vagueness of opinion. Some citizens have suggested that the town council should take the matter up, pointing out towns where a municipal rink has successfully prevailed. We fancy the council would not be anxious to assume any responsibility, as the town's finances are taxed almost to the limit now, but if the citizens of the town would form a joint stock company, with shares small enough for everybody to take one or more, it would be reasonable to ask the town to lend its support by guaranteeing the company's bonds. A suggestion that will perhaps appeal to many citizens is that the scheme take the form of putting up a building that can be used for skating and hockey rink, and also to accommodate public mass meetings, etc.

## Halton Nurse's Report

During the past eight months, Miss E. Alexander, of Milton, school nurse for Halton county, has inspected 5,568 children. Miss Alexander's work has been satisfactorily commented upon in all parts of the county and parents are realizing that the inspection she makes are helping materially in preserving and improving the health of the school children. When it is remembered that Miss Alexander covers all of Halton county, parents get some idea of the tremendous amount of work she has to do. In Toronto, for instance, there is a nurse in every school, while in some schools there are two, who devote all their time to inspections in the one building.

Miss Alexander's report for eight months follows: Children inspected, 5,568; defects found, 959; defects corrected, 974; homes visited, 578; treatments, 24; pediculosis cases, 78; skin diseases and infections, 38; financial assistance given for seven operations. Hot lunches are being served in two schools, and the plan has been so successful that others may follow.
