Forty-Seven Years Ago

In 1875 the Bank of Hamilton opened a branch in Georgetown, this being the first branch of a chartered bank in the County of Halton. Strong and well equipped, progressive yet conservative, for fifty years this Bank has afforded absolute security to depositors.

Real Estate Purchased

Two of the best farms in Halton county were purchased by Toronto men last week. Dr. John Noble bought Thomas Grice's hundred acre farm on the middle road near Brant, known as the Broderick Farm, and E. A. Rowlett bought the Anselm Farm near Oakville.

The Entrance Examinations

The High School Entrance Examinations will begin at the different centres of the Province on Wednesday, June 28. The annual department examinations for the Junior Public School graduation Lower School, Middle School and Upper School, will commence on Tuesday, June 18.

Installing Chimes

Mr. W. Dick who has just completed installing the chimes in the Metropolitan Church, Toronto, was in town on Monday making arrangements to install the Lawson Memorial Chimes in the Presbyterian Church here. The work will be commenced next week. The Board of Managers expect to have the installing completed so that the chimes may be played for the first time on Easter Sunday.

Georgetown Incubators

In addition to his already large business, Mr. J. B. Mackenzie, lumber merchant and contractor, has added another line and is now manufacturing incubators at his planing mills here. Although they have only been on the market about three weeks, many orders have already been received and the demand for them is increasing daily. A large number of these new incubators were shipped last week, some going as far as Nova Scotia.

Farm Loans in Halton

The first Farm Loan Association in Halton County was established in Nassagaweya Township. Last week the second Farm Loan Association in the County was organized in Eaqueing Township with the following officers:—President, W. F. Bradley, Georgetown; Vice-President, Norman Wrigglesworth, Georgetown; Director, Edwin Harrop, Milton; Municipality Trustees, J. R. Lindsay and R. McCullough, Georgetown. The association expects to be ready for business in about a week.

Trip to Hawaii

The following item appeared in the Daily Telegraph of Long Beach, California on March 18th: "Mrs. Jennip Manahan, Miss Louisa Harrison and Dr. Nellie Schenk have taken transportation on the 'Mau' of the Matsonia line for April 5, when they will sail for Honolulu and the Hawaiian Islands. The party will motor to San Francisco in Dr. Schenk's car, which will be shipped to the islands. As the trip is being made partly for Mrs. Manahan's health, an indefinite stay is planned."

Passing of Merchants Bank

There is no longer a branch of the Merchants Bank of Canada in operation in Georgetown. According to the order-in-council passed at Ottawa last week the Merchants Bank goes out of existence, its assets being taken over by the Bank of Montreal. Signs are displayed at the local branch indicating that the former branch of the Merchants Bank will in future be known as a branch of the Bank of Montreal. There will be no change in the staff as far as is known at present, and Mr. Mimms will continue as manager of the local branch, thereby assuring customers continued courteous treatment and best accommodation in their banking business.

Neglected Stock

On Monday of last week, at Oakville, Wm. Richardson and his wife of Trafalgar, near Palermo, appeared before Police Magistrate Shields, charged by Inspector Davidson of the Humage Society, with cruelty in starving their cattle. The inspector said there was plenty of food for the animals, but Richardson was too lazy to attend to the feeding. The Inspector had visited the farm on Saturday afternoon, accompanied by Dr. Heslop, of Milton. They found five animals in a box stall in which there should not have been more than two. There were seventy cattle, thirty of which had not been neglected. Young Pilger Mrs. Richardson's son, attended to them. The couple were convicted and released on suspended sentence.
