**No K. C. For Gregory**  
A couple of weeks ago the Attorney-General issued a list of 91 barristers appointed as King's Counsel. One of them, W. D. Gregory, of Oakville, has declined and remains by his own preference, plain W. D. Gregory. In a letter to the Attorney-General Mr. Gregory said:  
"No duties are attached to the office of King's Counsel and it appears to me that no public interest requires the making of such appointments. There is no form of examination or test and no fixed standard for determining to whom the title should be given. There is bound to be dissatisfaction and resentment, whatever the composition of the list may be.  
I feel strongly that the practice of giving certain barristers precedence over others in the courts by making them King's Counsel is unduly and out of harmony with the democratic standards that generally prevail in Canada. It seems to me that there is no place where there should be a special grade and one of hierarchy. No do I see any reason why lawyers should be given precedence over their fellows—any more than that official precedence should be given to certain men in other professions or callings.  
Canadian would not of themselves have created the office of King's Counsel. It had not its origin in Canada and has not its roots in our soil. When we brought over our political institutions from the old land, we brought with the good timber some dead-wood, and the office of King's Counsel was part of the dead-wood."
