Women's Work in India
The annual open meeting of the Baptist Mission "Christ was held on Friday, April 7th at 8 p.m. Miss K. McLaurin, on furlough from the India field, gave the address on "Women's Work in India." Miss McLaurin is a native of India her father and mother having been in mission work on that field for a number of years. She has been on the field in active work for 29 years.
Miss McLaurin said status of woman is very low in India. This is true in all mission fields. They are valued and treated as chattel, being often compared to cattle, no thought being given to their education and very little to religious training. Yet the women of India have and exert a real power, especially as they influence the lives of the children; those being left practically wholly to their care. As a result, women often give the most obstinate opposition to progressive changes and nowhere is this more true than in her opposition to Christianity. Blindly opposed, because Christianity is the only religion to honor woman and give her equal right and privileges with men. This is manifestly true in India as all the schools, helpful training colleges and medical colleges, etc., for girls and women have been instituted and carried on first by Christian Missionaries.
For mission work India is apportioned approximately one Missionary to 50,000 people.
The work is to evangelize, christianize, organize and build up churches. To day the spirit of change and progress is felt all through India. Men and women are demanding education for their boys and girls. It therefore the day of opportunity for Christian Missions.
After the address a number met Miss McLaurin and thanked her for her instructive address.
The collection for Missions amounted to about \$30.
