satisfactory. My lemon pie could

baked beans and brown stew and

**Grand Master Ponton  
Visits Credit Lodge**

Friday evening, May 5th, will be  
long remembered by the Officers

of the Grand Lodge of Canada,  
Province of Ontario. Credit

During the evening's program  
W. Bro. H. Corke, in appropriate  
and well chosen words, on behalf  
of the Officers and members of  
Credit Lodge, presented Grand  
Master Ponton with a scroll, the  
cover page of which carried a  
beautiful design of "The All-seeing  
Eye watching the Flight of Time"  
and the following inscription—  
"Presented to Most Worshipful

the Province of Ontario, by the

signed and had the original quaint

**Hydro Shows  
Real Profits**

The official audited figures made  
public last week by the Hydro  
Electric Power Commission of  
Ontario show Georgetown Hydro  
to be in a flourishing condition.  
The report says:  
Georgetown, with approximately  
2,200 population, is 101 miles from  
the generating station at Niagara  
Falls. Before it began taking  
Hydro electric energy in Septem-  
ber, 1918, the average rate for  
energy was 10 cents per kilowatt  
hour.

The average rates charged dur-  
ing the first year of operation by  
the Provincial Hydro electric  
Commission was 7.2 cents dom-  
est and 8 cents commercial.  
These have been reduced until  
they now stand at 3.1 cents and  
3.1 cents, largely because the load  
has increased from 104.8 horse-  
power to 539.2 horsepower. The  
rate for energy delivered to  
Georgetown has been reduced from  
\$88 to \$85, despite an increased  
generating cost at Niagara. The  
actual saving to consumers by  
rate reductions since 1914 has  
been \$49,142.32.

The revenue in 1921 was \$89,  
805.89, the expenditure was \$31,  
582.05. After placing \$3,171.70  
to plant renewals reserve there was  
a surplus of \$44.84.

The balance sheet as at Decem-  
ber 31, 1921, showed assets of \$54,  
005.89 and liabilities of \$17,496.12.  
In eight years the system has ac-  
cumulated a surplus of \$36,236.82,  
which with reserves makes a total  
of \$46,609.41.
