The Duke's Mackintosh. "Like water off a duck's back" is a phrase that we often use...

And birds are soon saturated by a heavy shower of rain. You may say that is not so. But a drop of water can make a duck's back waterproof.

These birds are provided with a natural mackintosh in the shape of a covering of feathers which fit tightly on to the top of the other.

But their plumage does not remain waterproof if they did not look after it carefully.

Every feather must be greased at least once a day if it is to turn the trick.

Watch a duck after its bath and you will see the process. The beak is pushed over the roots of the feathers and it is brought up to the very tips of the feathers.

Fighting Germs. In the great realm of nature every creature preys upon its fellows.

Even microbes, the most living things that the microscope reveals to us, are, for their size, as voracious as the most savage lions.

And now comes an amazing discovery made at the famous Pasteur Institute in Paris.

These creatures—ultra-microbes—can be isolated, bred, and strengthened until they are ready to fall like an avenging host upon the terms of disease.

Crabs as surgeons. The surgeon of limbs is common among crustaceans and crabs.

When the limb is seized or when it is damaged by the fall of a stone...

There is a particular line of weakness—the breakage plane. The surgeon is brought about by the forcible contraction of muscles.

Nearest of all is an arrangement inside the base of the leg whereby hardening material is drawn up the legs close up the wound and prevents bleeding.

Inside the crab's bandaging membrane a new leg is formed in miniature, and after a time, when the crab moults its husk, this new leg shoots out like a jack-in-the-box and soon hardens.

Advertising is a good investment—just as plate glass windows are. Advertising sells more goods to more persons than shop-windows do.

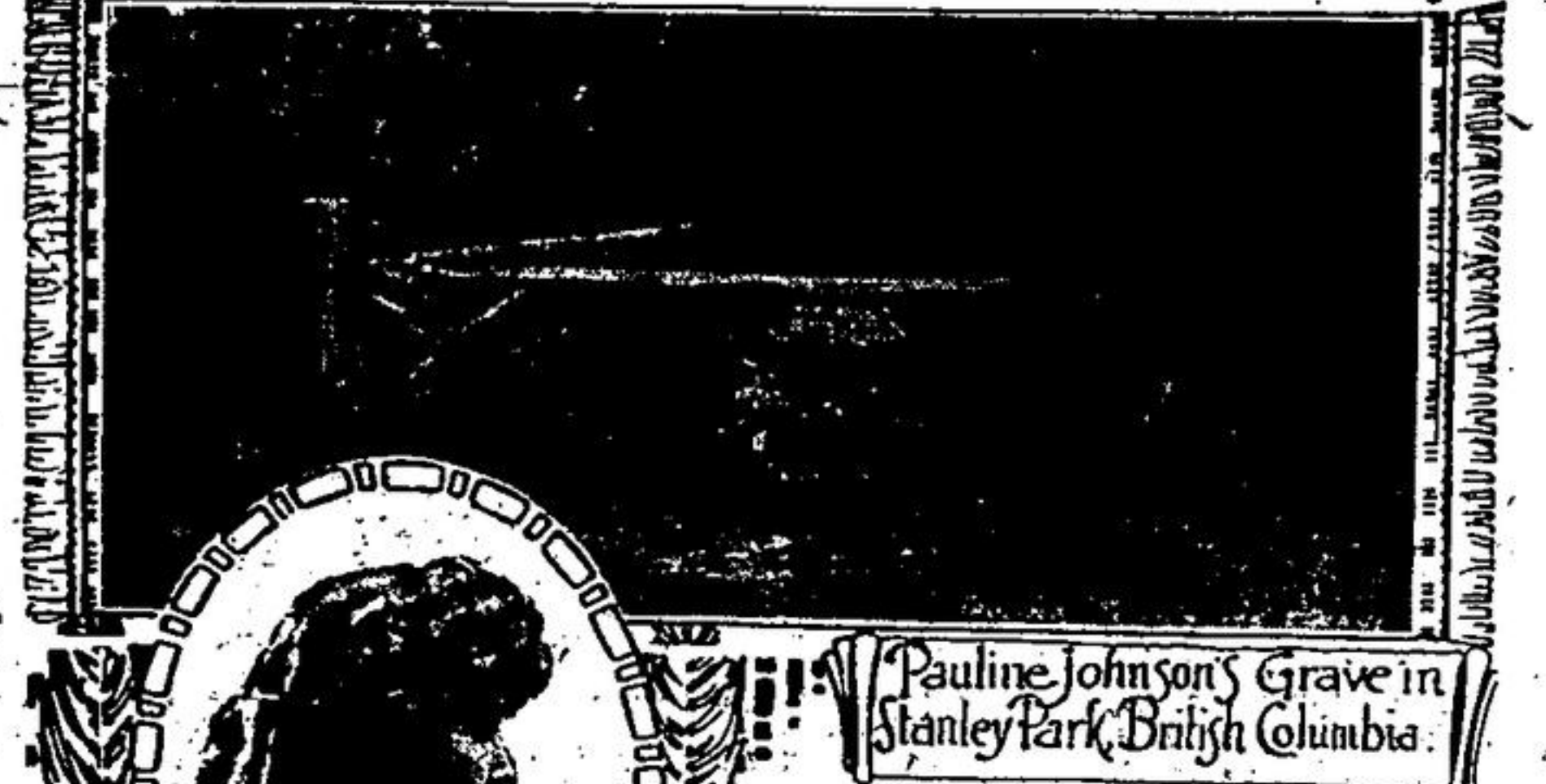

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SHIFTERS MADE MONEY

STRANGE GET-CASH-QUICK SCHEME AMONG FLAPPERS. Peculiar Method by Which Many Young Women in the Cities of the United States Got a Few Extra Dollars to Spend on Their Clothes and on Pleasure Shows.

Who called them flappers for the first time we do not know, but the word seemed to get that name was coined in New York City.

It may have had something to do originally with the flapping over shoes, which the race of flappers always lost unobtrusively.

The first reference to this fad that appeared in a book, so far as we are aware, was in Miss Edna Roberts' "Girls," one of whom was the typical flapper.

Having been appropriately named, and having adopted by common consent a badge that instantly distinguished them, the young girls enjoyed for a time their prominence in the public eye.

They felt that they had achieved something very much like what Mrs. Pankhurst and her associates had gained for the older women.

But it was not long before the wearing of ubiquitous goldie's failed to excite and stimulate the girls. Another sensation was necessary, and it was left for some bright girl in New York to discover it.

She founded the order of the Shifters. For some little time past New York has been discussing the Shifters.

The society had a membership of tens of thousands before it ever found its way into the newspapers, and when it first began to appear the general reader was at first under the impression that a sort of ladies' auxiliary to the Ku Klux Klan had appeared.

Some girls made as much as \$12 a week in selling for a quarter brass tags worth, perhaps, twenty-five cents a hundred.

In fact, it was one of their favorite schemes like that of Get-Rich-Quick Miller that made money for everybody as long as it lasted.

In reality it was not more sound economically than the idea of people getting rich by taking advantage of the victim.

The last owners were the victims. The fad spread to Wall Street, where it was taken up by young men who were amused with the notion of selling a brass clip for, perhaps, \$10, and for a while-silly boys and heads of firms interested in clips.

They were stung, but they passed on the sting, just like a few years ago they used to make fortunes with the outfit of making other buffaloes.

But as we have said, by this time the flapper's kind of the game had and are now on the lookout for something else with a kick to it.
