In The Third Division Court of The County of Halton

CORPORATION OF GEORGETOWN v. GAMBLE
 Judgment—
 This is an action to recover \$22.78 being taxes alleged to be due to the Corporation of Georgetown by the defendant on his income assessment for 1930 with the statutory percentage added for non-payment.

The assessment was regularly made but it is admitted no notice thereof was given to the defendant as required by Sec. 49 of the act, or omission to do so provided that the defendant had been notified in a newspaper in the municipality.

After the roll has been finally passed by the Court of Revision and certified by the clerk or further amended by the Judge, if there are any appeals to him, Sec. 70 of the act provides that it shall be valid and bind all parties concerned notwithstanding any defect or error committed in or with respect to such roll or any defect, error or misstatement in the notice required by Sec. 49 of the act, or omission to deliver or transmit such notice.

In view of this express provision, although it may work great hardship to the defendant, I must hold him liable for the taxes sued for and I give judgment therefore for the Plaintiff against the defendant for the sum of \$22.78 to be paid in 14 days but in the circumstances will not give any costs.

I would suggest if the defendant has been unproprietarily assessed, he apply to the council to remit the taxes, and if the facts warrant it I think they should do so, or such part thereof as may be right and just.
