A meeting of the Halton County Council was held here Wednesday night of last week at which thirteen firms of bond dealers tendered for the debentures to the amount of \$59,000, to be issued by the county of Halton under by-law No. 469. The highest tender, \$29,500, was received from R. C. Matthews & Co., Ltd., Toronto. It was accepted.

Notes and Comments
CANADA'S TOTAL POPULATION
up to June 1 is 9,788,498. This is the final figure issued last week of sixth census recently taken of the provinces. Ontario leads the way with a population of 2,939,622

HEADS OF FAMILIES will welcome the additional exemption of \$100 on every child given by the Government on the income tax, though it is still woefully inadequate as reasonable compensation for the cost of bringing a child up. The childless people are the ones that profit in a pecuniary sense every time.

THE NEW VOTERS' LIST ACT, passed by the Legislature, provides a price term for officials who intentionally omit names entitled to appear on the lists. This should have the result of eliminating the political bias which has sometimes prevailed in the preparation of voters' lists in the past.

THE FARMERS' BURN suggests milk booths as a desirable addition to the fall fairs and farmers' picnics. A great number of school fairs throughout Canada and the United States have been having at least one "milk bar" on the fair grounds, where pure, clean ice-cold milk can be had at cost. The suggestion is a good one and well worth trying out.

ONLY TWO PERSONS in Canada had incomes of more than one million dollars during the fiscal year 1921-22. This information was given to E. R. Spencer (Progressive, Battle River) in the House of Commons last week. For the same year 19 corporations paid taxes on incomes of more than \$1,000,000. The aggregate of incomes represented by the amount collected under the Income Tax Act was \$912,410,428. There are 194,267 persons paying income tax in the Dominion.

THE SERIES of advertisements that are being run in our columns at the present time, dealing with the matter of forest preservation, are worth careful study and consideration. The matter is a serious one, from the national point of view. Our forest wealth is becoming more precious every year. Every effort by the individual citizen as well as by those in authority should be made for its preservation as well as its extension. Forest fires are the cause of its wasteful destruction and they can be prevented, if not wholly, at least to a very great extent.
