Immortalized Friends.

Four poets of first rank—Milton, Shelley, Tennyson, and Matthew Arnold—were immortalized by writing memorial poems about them. The greatest is the first, " Lycidas," one of the finest poems in any language. Yet it was written about a man otherwise unknown.

Edmund Spenser by his way to Ireland to visit his people when the ship was wrecked and the young traveler was drowned in the sea. The ship was a "perfidious barque, built in th' eclipse, and rig'd with cursed dark."

John Keats is doubly immortalized. He immortalized himself and was immortalized by Shelley's memorial poem, "Ode on Keats." It is one of the best poems in literature and these two poets lie in the same cemetery—the English cemetery in Rome. The first was buried in Italy in search of health and died; the other was wrecked off the coast and was drowned.

Had not Tennyson written "In Memoriam," nobody would ever have heard of his friend Henry Arthur Hallam. They were bosom companions, and Hallam was engaged to Tennyson's sister, "In Memoriam" is the most popular memorial poem ever written, and lines from it like " 'Tis better to have loved and lost—than never to have loved at all," are known and quoted by everybody.

Arthur Hugh Clough and Matthew Arnold were at Tom Brant's school together. Clough was a splendid fellow, and had a great influence on Arnold. He went to live at Florence, where he died at the age of forty. "Thyrsis," Arnold's lament for his dead friend, is a noble tribute.

Another example of a double immortality is Sir David Wilkie. He died and was buried at sea. This incident fired the imagination of Turner, and he painted the masterpiece which hangs in the National Gallery: "Peace," Burial of Sir David Wilkie at Sea.

Princess Mary's Honeycomb.

The Villa Medici, where Princess Mary and Viscount Lascelles spent part of their honeymoon, has been called the "Queen" of the villas of Frascati, outside Florence. It is said to be the most beautiful of the many stately country houses that crowd the steep slope between Frascati and San Donato, about two miles outside the city. It was built in 1455 for Cosimo dei Medici, but not much of the original building now remains, as it was largely destroyed towards the end of the eighteenth century. It was bought in 1863 by Mr. William Speyer, a wealthy Englishman. When the Duke and Duchess of Teck and Princess Mary—now Queen Mary—were in Florence in the early eighties they more than once visited the Villa Medici when Mr. Speyer was host there. Lady Sybil Scott, who has recently become the owner of the villa, is a first cousin of Viscount Lascelles.
