Peanut Worth Points.

We used to wonder at the Brad-burys when they first appeared, for until the war they had no English note of less than five points in value, though other nations and their colonies as low as five shillings.

During the war, however, printed notes which were worth only two pence-halfpenny each, and many French and Italian notes had passed into possession and exchange.

Today Germany appears to be competing for the world's eye of its paper money. The town of Zougen-zou has turned out notes worth one pfennig each. A pfennig is only one-hundredth part of a mark, and the present rate of exchange is over a thousand marks to the pound.

But even Germany's little notes are worth out to local holders. One-cent notes are worth one-hundredth of a pound each. As the rate is nominally worth two and a half cents you can buy the mark for a worth of roughly.

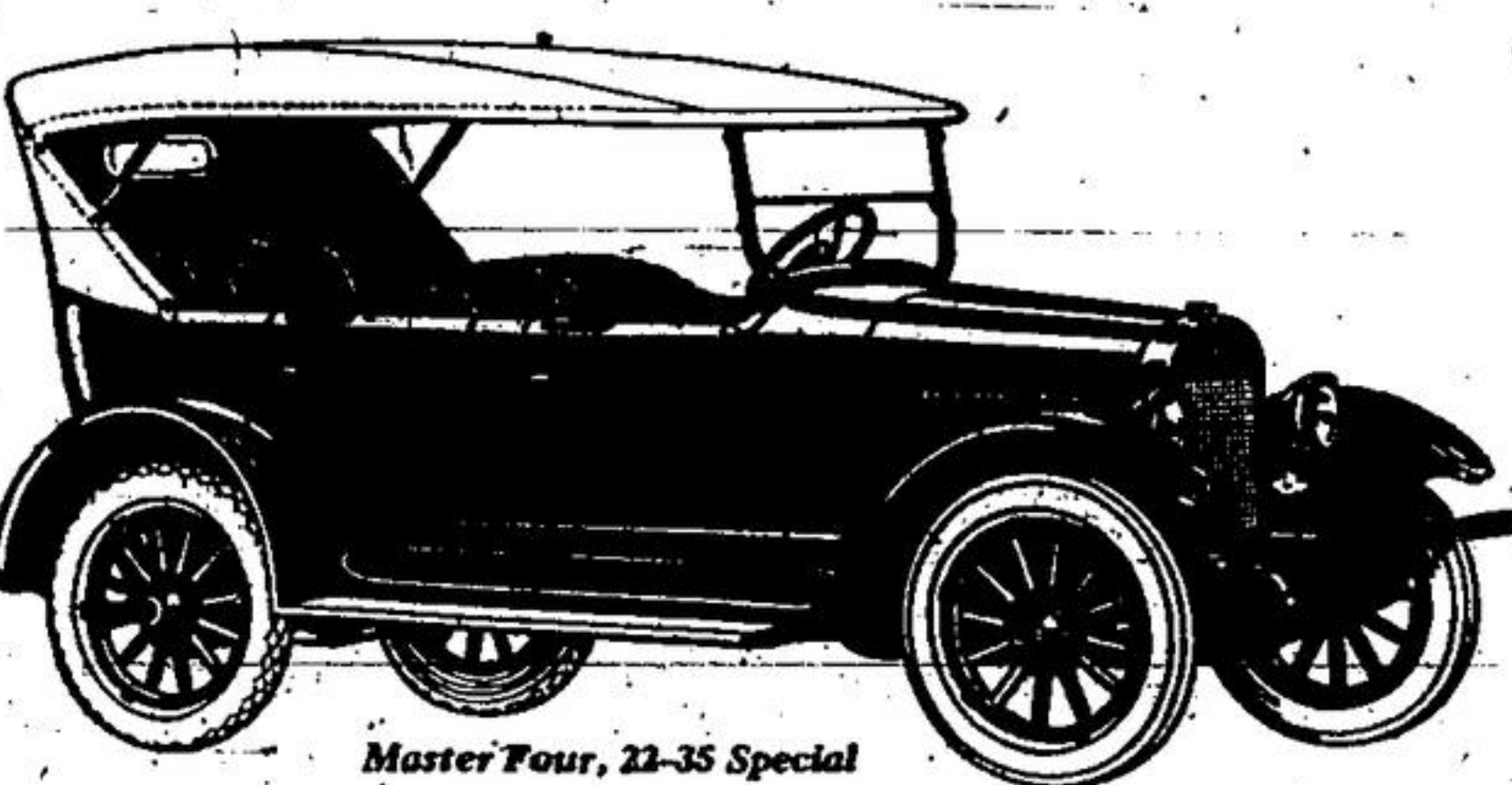
