**Two Fire Alarms in Two Days**

The Fire Brigade was called from its slumbers on Monday morning at about 4.30 to attend on outbreak of fire in the barn of Mrs. Mary McLean on the 9th line. The barn was discovered ablaze by some neighbors who immediately raised the alarm but their efforts to save the barn and contents were of no avail and the season's crop of hay and hedges were completely lost. There is a small insurance.

On Tuesday morning at about 6.50 the Fire Brigade was again called out for a fire at the Eaton Farm on the 8th line occupied by J. H. McCauley. The fire which is supposed to have started from the gasoline engine, proved a disastrous one for Mr. McCauley. Three large barns, seven head of cattle (registered), one horse and the season's crop were lost and but for the prompt and heroic work of the firemen and neighbors the implements and home would have been lost. The damage is roughly estimated at about \$15,000 and only partly covered by insurance.

A Georgetown ratepayer writes the Herald as follows:—  
EDITOR THE HERALD:—  
I was interested in reading the by-laws to be submitted to the ratepayers at an early date involving a total of \$46,000.00.

I am writing simply to urge upon the Council the necessity of regarding the interests of the people in this, as in all matters that involve the disposition of public monies. Perhaps careful investigation has already been made and the members of Council are prepared to give these loans their hearty recommendation. I hope such is the case. I could name a municipality not a hundred miles from Georgetown that made a large loan without properly examining the securities of the borrower or and it was more than a quarter century before the town concerned recovered from the staggering loss. And by the way, it is not many years since Georgetown narrowly escaped a similar fate.

I know nothing of the merits of propositions now submitted for the ratepayers' approval. The desire for industrial expansion in Georgetown is entirely commendable. What I want to emphasize is that the securities offered for these proposed loans should be adequate to prevent any possibility of loss. Yours very truly,

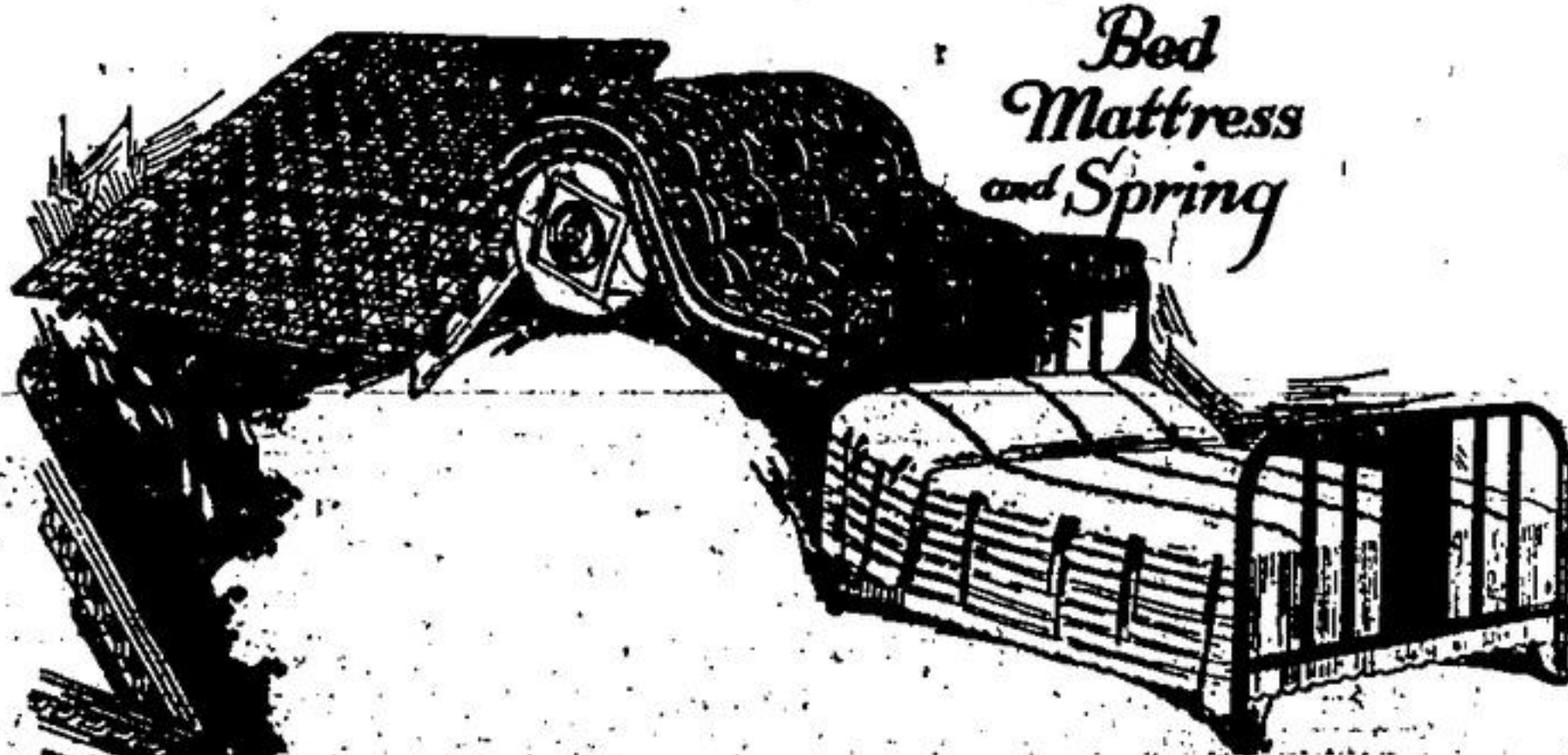
