The Hydro Electric Power Commission hereby gives notice that it has under the provisions of the Navigable Waters Protection Act, deposited with the Minister of Public Works at Ottawa, and in the office of the Registrar of Titles for the County of Wentworth at Hamilton, Ontario, a description of the site and plan of a Street Tower Transmission Line to be built across Burlington Bay in front of Hamilton Beach.
