Jurisdiction Further Extended
An Order-in-Council, approved by His Honor the Lieutenant-Governor has been passed appointing E. P. Moore of Acton, Police Magistrate for the County of Halton and part of the County of Wellington, also for the County of Peel. His jurisdiction for this new territory will be concurrent with that of the Police Magistrates now having jurisdiction in Peel County.

Three Actes in Collision
While returning home from a fishing outing in Grey county last week, the Ford sedan of Mr. George Hill and the Chevrolet sedan of Mr. W. H. Foster were badly damaged in a collision with an Orangeville touring car, owned and driven by Charles Gillespie of Orangeville. The accident happened in the village of Caledon and the occupants in the three cars had a miraculous escape from serious injury.

Caledon By-Laws
Caledon ratepayers will vote on a by-law to assume control of the township telephone system, and also one granting a franchise to the Dover Oil and Gas Company to supply gas to the township. The latter company has found gas in two wells with a combined flow of 800,000 feet and has increased its holdings from 900 to nearly 2,000 acres. They will not only take the electors have voted on the by-law.

Not Work of Incendiarism
Following the investigation into the recent big fire on the H. C. Cox farm, Oakville, Provincial Fire Marshal Heaton said he believed the fire had been caused by a spontaneous combustion of hay. He did not think it had been the work of incendiarism. Hugh Wilson on whose farm a fire occurred about three months previous said in the witness box that there were facts in connection with that fire which did not come out at the probe. Fire Marshal Heaton said he considered any further investigation into similar fires unnecessary. There was no evidence to show the blaze was the result of revenge.

Ontario's Long-Lived Sheriff
Sheriff A. Hagar, of Prescott and Russell Counties, aged 85, and the oldest incumbent of that office in the province, has been superannuated by the Provincial Government and his deputy for many years, Samuel W. Wright, appointed to succeed him. Sheriff Hagar occupied the post for 35 years. That a Sheriff's position seems to be conducive of longevity is evidenced by the ripe age to which numerous other old-time officials have attained in Ontario. At present, the following are still serving, having passed the age of 75 years: W. Elliot, St. Thomas, aged 79; Samuel Webster, Milton, 80; D. MacMartin, Perth, 78; G. D. Hawley, Napanee, 81; J. Hall Peterboro', 85; J. Smith, Welland 86 and A. Allan, Quilich, 79.

Serious Fun For Four Boys
On Saturday, August 26, Harry Hilton of Neessawaga, and Robert Buck of Nelson, were driving to Campbellville in their Ford car to attend a baseball match. They were both unfortunate in stalling their cars, and friends happening along, they left the cars on the side of the road and proceeded to Campbellville in their friend's car. When they returned in the evening they found the cars had been maliciously damaged. The windshields had been smashed with stones and other damages committed. Eye witnesses allege that four Georgetown youths are the culprits. Informations were laid before Police Magistrate Dice of Milton, by Constable Chesley and the four young men will come up for trial before County Police Magistrate Moore for hearing in the course of a few days.—Acton Free-Press.

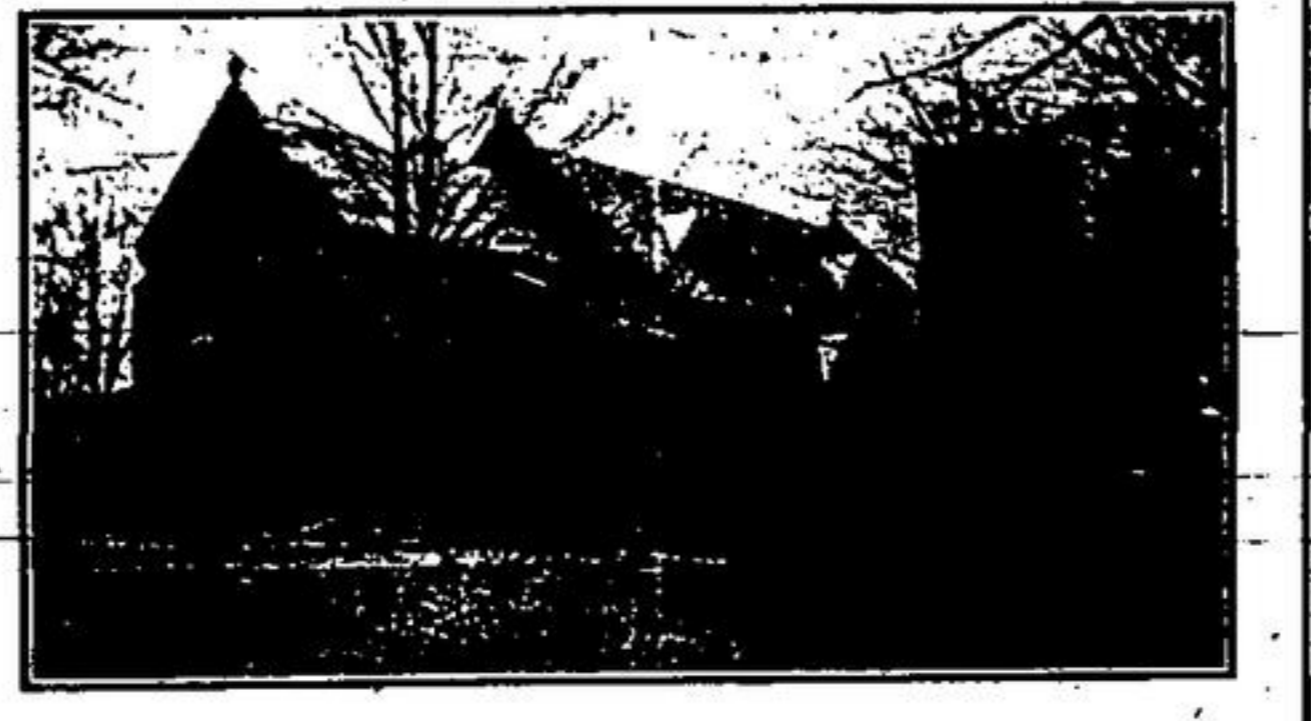
