**Obituary**  
 CLARENCE E. O. GLEADALL  
 A highly respected resident in the person of Clarence E. O. Gleadall passed away on Tuesday last in his 51st year. Deceased came to Coldwater, Canada, in 1887, but after three months returned to the Old Country where he joined the York and Lancaster Regiment. He served 18 years with the colors and saw active service in the African campaign, taking part in the famous raid on the Toppa. He was a survivor of the wrecked troop ship, Warren Hastings, and an Indian veteran. On his discharge from the army in 1908 he came to Canada and settled in Georgetown where he has since resided.


