WITH SOME PEOPLE in Canada are demanding that the gates be opened to the foreigners who are knocking for admission, newspapers in the United States are pointing to the penalties which that country is paying as a consequence of being the gate-keeper to the too wide. A Chicago paper points out that all the men involved in some recently discovered plots for the wrecking of trains came from countries where oppression and tradition breed hatred of government and cheapen life. These people seem incapable of appreciating orderly government. They have little capacity and less desire for freedom as it is understood by those accustomed to constitutional government. There was a time when the idea prevailed in the United States and Canada that there was practically no limit to the capacity of the public schools for converting almost any kind of foreign material into good citizenship. The idea must be abandoned. Experience has shown that many of the people—certainly not all, but many—who come from foreign countries never become citizens in any proper sense of the word. They may learn to speak and write the English language because they find it useful to do so, but they continue to be aliens in sentiment and in outlook.

**Coal is Scarce**

The papers are telling you about the shortage of coal, read the following:  
 "A sixty per cent. rationing for all regions getting anthracite from Pennsylvania was declared by the Pennsylvania fuel commission this morning and was approved by representatives of the fuel commission of other states.

The Pennsylvania fuel commission bases its decision on the fact that between now and April 1st the output production will be sixty per cent. of the annual output. That is to say, that from April 1st until the same date next year, instead of something over eighty million tons of anthracite being produced, the total will be in the neighborhood of fifty million tons at the most.  
 With such a scarcity of coal it is "bound to be a high price." It takes about 72 lbs. of coal to equal 16 lbs. (two gallons) of coal oil in best production, so with coal oil at 28c per gallon you should be able to save some money this winter by getting an Oil Gas Burner and you will not have to shovel coal and ashes.
