THEODORE BRAIN
In the death of Mr. Theodore Brain, farmer of "The Pines", Hornby, which occurred on Saturday, Nov. 24th, Halton County has lost one of its oldest and most highly esteemed residents. The deceased gentleman was a native of the county and was in his 88th year, and in the last surviving member of the family of the late John Brain, a U. E. Loyalist pioneer, who settled in Halton a century ago, when it was almost a wilderness. 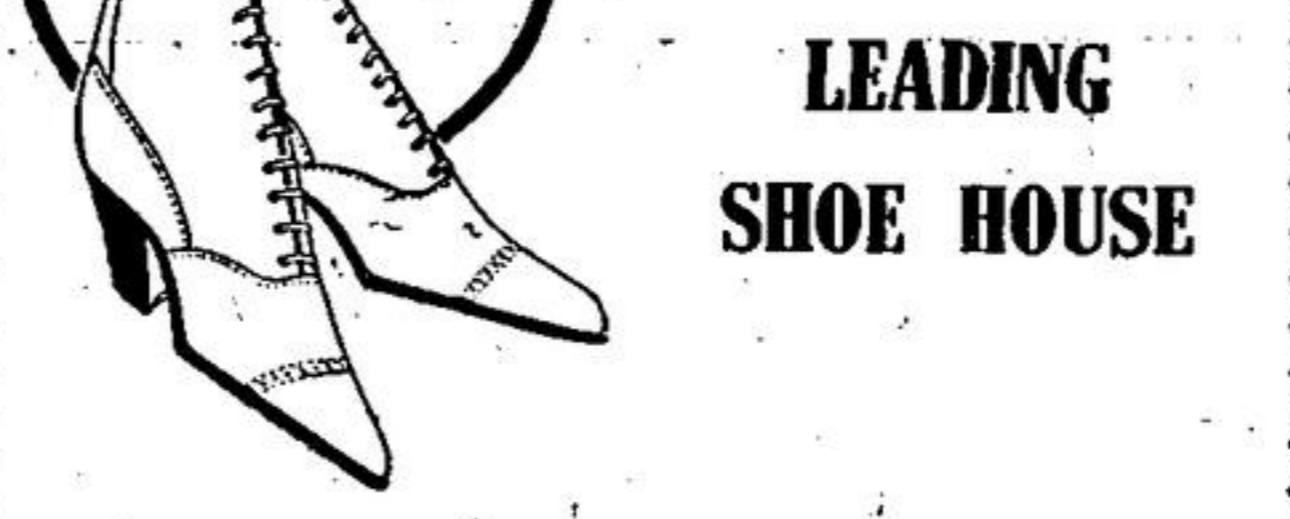
