The Oakville Bridge

Hon. S. C. Biggs came to Milton

last Friday to discuss with the county council the proposed erection of a high level bridge at Oakville, on the Toronto-llamilton highway. He asked the council to agree that the county pay 20 per cent. of the estimated expendi ture, which is about \$98,000, Oak ville to pay 20 per cent. and the province 60 per cent. Sidewalks are included in the estimates.
