Speaking to Dairymen
At Stratford last Friday, Hon. Minister of Agriculture, Ontario, Minister of Agriculture, is quoted as saying: "Unless the banks adopted a more lenient attitude toward the farmers' co-operative enterprise, next year's consideration of the Bank Act might include a revision of that measure." Citing the position of the Niagara Peninsula Growers' as an example, he said this company had found itself with an overdraft of \$25,000. When the organization was formed the bank promised credit to any amount, but when the overdraft had reached \$25,000 it closed down on the company and gave it three days to settle. In my opinion it is better to break a bank or two than that one of these co-operative organizations should fail.

Town Council

Council met with Mayor Dale in the chair, Reeve Heartwell and all members of Council present. Minutes of previous month's meetings were read and confirmed.

Communications were received from H. G. Meir, Davis & Lent, Brampton; Lunenburg Engineering and Transport Co., United States; Fidelity and Guaranty Co. and Taylor Construction Co.

Mr. I. P. McEnery spoke re his assessment on a lot on the corner of his farm stating that he thought his assessment too high.

It J. Hynds addressed the Council re insurance on truck, fire hall, and real house at station.

A delegation of merchants waited on the Council petitioning against a cigar and tobacco license.

Moved by M. J. Near, seconded by Wm. H. Long that a By-law be given a rebate on his taxes on a lot on the corner of his farm of three dollars, his assessment being too high. Carried.

Moved by A. Duncan, seconded by George Harrington that the Georgetown Arns Co. debentures be hypothecated in the Bank of Montreal until such time as they are sold. Carried.

Moved by Wm. H. Long, seconded by H. J. Howard that a By-law to raise \$5000 by debentures, for a term of five years, be voted on by the ratepayers the same time as the next municipal elections, for a municipal to fall in the hands of the Town of Georgetown. Carried.

Moved by Wm. Barber, seconded by George Harrington that By-law No. 1 to provide for the appointment of an arbitrator on behalf of the Corporation of Georgetown in the matter of claim for damages of H. T. Arnold against the Corporation of Georgetown be now read and that the same be finally passed and that the seal of the corporation be attached thereto. Carried.

Mr. J. B. MacKenzie was appointed arbitrator for the town.

A number of accounts were passed.

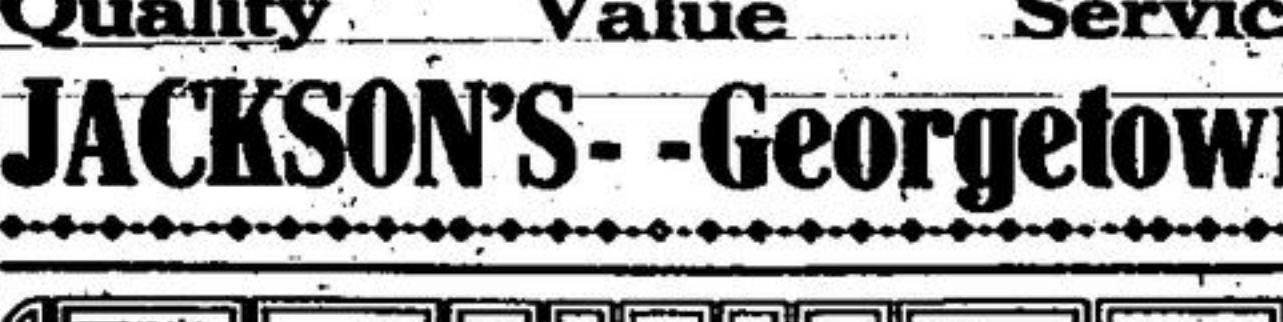
