Premier Drury At Georgetown

Large Gathering Great Ontario's Premier—Tendered Banquet After Address

There was a large gathering at the town hall last Thursday evening and Premier Drury was given a hearty reception on the occasion of his visit to Halton's most progressive manufacturing town.

Mayor Grant was the chairman of the evening and after appropriate introductory remarks, called on Mayor Dale who gave an address of welcome and expressed the pleasure of Council and citizens at being honored by a visit from the Premier of Canada's premier province.

Reeve Heartwell, members of Council, representatives of the School Board and Chamber of Commerce were on the platform.

The Premier was heartily applauded as he rose to address the gathering. In reviewing the record of his government and giving account of his stewardship as Halton's representative the Premier declined all governmental responsibility for the recent fire in Northern Ontario. That catastrophe was not a fire in government forests he said. Scarcely a foot of government forest was affected. It was a settler's fire through a country almost as cleared as Halton county. It had nothing to do with the government administration of the fire protection service.

In defending increased expenditures on roads he maintained that the substitution of motor cars for horse-drawn vehicles and the wider radius of travel in all directions, coupled with an increased burden of traffic, had necessitated a comprehensive system of provincial highways through every county.

Some critics think a road with a superfluous surface should grow up in the night, but our policy is to do permanent work in a permanent way and we are building for hundreds of years to come. It was wise expenditure because it brought tourist traffic from across the line, brought markets to every door and was conducive to prosperity. The Premier strongly decried that provincial highways increased the county rate and as an instance of the financial working out of the scheme he showed that while Halton county contributed \$5,900 to provincial roads, the province helped Halton county roads to the extent of \$18,100.

Regarding the Mothers' Allowance Act, Mr. Drury declared it was really most important to look after the human element than the material element of the province.

The spending of this money is much better than spending money to induce immigration of people whom we have to Canadianize after they get here.

In connection with the radial question he thought that the whole province saw the wisdom of the government action. He hoped and he thought that Sir Henry Thornton was a man capable of performing his great task as head of the National Railways, but he was assuming a task rendered far more difficult by an unwise system of railroad paralleling. It has seemed to the government of Ontario that to further promote a situation of this kind would be disastrous in the extreme. The government had decided not to guarantee radial bonds even at the risk of unpopularity.

In case of deficits on any radial it would not be fair to ask the whole province to bear the burden when only one section benefited. This situation had arisen in the loss on the Nipigon Hydro development.

The Premier did not indicate whether he would again contest Halton county, but said he had been offered from Simcoe county by a sharp practice. "While I
