**Obituary**

**WALTER J. MCKAY**—The following from the Quebec Chronicle refers to a brother of our esteemed townsman, Mr. Walter J. McKay, who passed away on Sunday, December 17th, after two days illness. Mr. Walter J. McKay, the greatly esteemed assistant superintendent for the Ottawa Electric Limited, the contractors for the extension to the Chateau Frontenac. The late Mr. McKay was born in Georgetown, Ontario, about 48 years ago, and leaves his widow, two brothers and three sisters to mourn his loss. A veteran of many years, the late Quartermaster-Sergeant McKay, remarkable for his even temperament, was one of the original members of the 90th Winnipeg Rifles (The Little Black Devils), with which regiment he served throughout the Northwest rebellion of 1869-70 at Assiniboia, at St. Charles and Fish Creek, receiving with 16 years active service to his credit and his old regiment honored him by appointing him an honorary life member. On the outbreak of the Great War, he was very active in recruiting for the 9th Battalion. He was one of the best known and popular citizens in the West and as a crack shot will ever be remembered for his many victorious feats with his rifle. His house is replete with the cups, medals, badges, spoons, etc., he won at rifle meetings at Ottawa and elsewhere, among them being a silver cup for General's Rifle Club, and a bronze medal and the Taylor cup won outright with "Possibles" (85) on two occasions. He attended the Coronation of King Edward VII, representing the local Militia Rifle Club, and the proud wearer of three medals, viz. Northwest Rebellion, Long Service and Coronation. His love for shooting, always present, he joined the local Militia Rifle Club this season, just to keep his eye in. He was an active member of the Army and Navy Veterans' Association, Winnipeg Unit. Coming to the Chateau Frontenac works last year, after a year ago, Mr. McKay resumed his activities under Mr. W. P. Mitchell, the Superintendent, with whom he had been associated for twelve years, and his duties in fact only a seasonal job to him, but to all members of the firm, he was greatly respected by all and the spontaneity of the request of his subordinates to attend his obsequies, at Mount Hermon Cemetery, was a fitting tribute to the honor they bore him and the knowledge of the loss of a friend whom all will be difficult to replace.

**ANNE CLARK**—The remains of the late Anne Clark, who passed away at the home of Mr. Grenville Clark, Goderich on Dec. 18th, were interred in Greenwood Cemetery here on Thursday last. The funeral took place from the home of her sister, Mrs. Alice Toyn, and the service was conducted by Rev. P. P. Camarion. Deceased conducted a confectionery business in Georgetown for over forty years, retiring from same some few years ago. She was one of our most highly respected citizens and had a wide circle of friends in Georgetown and vicinity. A kind and loving friend and wife, she is missed by those who loved her.


