## THE SORE SHOULDER

Ill-itting Collars Cause Much Suffering to Horses.

Shoulder Galls Are Developed—Soaking the Collar in Water Helps to Remove the Galls and Destroy the Galls—Hessian Fly Control.

(Contributed by Ontario Department of Agriculture, Toronto.)  
A collar that does not fit the horse's neck and shoulder perfectly may be the cause of considerable suffering to the animal through soreness, chafing, and irritation. Hundreds of horses suffer each year, more especially during the period of warm weather, when the work on the land is pressing.

### Four Collars Cause Shoulder Galls.

Shoulder galls develop largely through the use of collars that do not fit properly. Through the draft being too high or too low, through neglect on the part of the driver to keep both collar and shoulder clean. When a teamster develops a bilatered heel or a sore toe the necessity of adjusting the collar is fully and manifestly apparent to him, so he fuses around and adjusts the boot or his foot to get relief for himself. A humane and thoughtful driver will do the same for his horse; but unfortunately there are many drivers who neglect to give their horses all the attention that a working animal is entitled to. Collars may fit the horse's shoulders as the animal is in the stable in good condition, but the shrinkage of flesh due to the hard work of several months may leave the horse with a collar much too large. The collar that is too large or not of the correct shape is bound to cause trouble. Sore neck, sore shoulders or unnecessary pain that may develop vicariously or other bad habits reduce the efficiency of the horse, should be avoided.

### A Horse's Neck Is Done From the Shoulder.

The work that the horse has to perform is done from the shoulder, so it is very important that extreme care be given to the fitting and adjustment of the collar. The new collar is generally so firm and stiff that it is difficult to mould it to the shape of the horse's neck and shoulder without soaking it in water overnight. After soaking a collar of the proper size in three inches of water, face down until well wet, it may be placed on the horse. The issue straps should be adjusted to draw the collar snugly to the neck. The collar in its softened condition will press into shape to suit the horse's neck. Be sure of the adjustment of the harness and draft. Work the horse only moderately the first few days while the shoulders are hardening and becoming used to the collar. Frequent airing and bathing is essential to the shoulder and prevent soreness and swelling. The horse's shoulder should be watched during the day when at heavy work, especially during hot weather. Bath with salt water each evening, and treat the galls with a dusting of zinc oxide. If the horse is so fortunate as to be in the hands of a good driver or teamster it is not likely to suffer from shoulder soreness, but if the horse is in the hands of a man who is responsible for the horse's welfare to give the working comfort of the faithful slave is entitled to every day in the week.—L. ### HESSIAN FLY CONTROL.

Is Found Best Effect by the Late Planting of Fall Wheat.

The late planting of wheat is generally recognized as being the most effective practice in Hessian fly control. Land for wheat should be prepared early, at least six weeks before seeding, in order that a firm seed bed with two inches of loose soil to provide ample covering when the seedling comes. Late in August or early in September narrow strips should be seeded across the field at intervals, these are for the purpose of attracting any Hessian flies that may be present and offering an inducement for egg laying. Between the fifth and tenth of October these egg-catching strips should be ploughed up and the entire field reworked and seeded. Lands that are in good condition will withstand Hessian fly attacks much better than poor ill-prepared soils, due to the fact that a weakened plant can make good recovery if well nourished. Prepare the land early, fertilize it if possible, and seed as late as you can expect the wheat to make sufficient growth for wintering.—L. Stevenson, Sec., Dept. of Agriculture, Toronto.

## By Law No.

A By-Law to authorize the issue of debentures of the Town of Georgetown, to the amount of eight thousand dollars for the purpose of erecting and placing a monument in commemoration of the Officers and men of the Town of Georgetown, who made the supreme sacrifice while on active service during the late war with the naval or military forces of Great Britain or her allies.

AND WHEREAS the rate payers of the said Town of Georgetown have requested the municipal council of the said Town of Georgetown, to erect a memorial in commemoration of the officers and men of the said Municipality who made the supreme sacrifice while on active service during the late war with the naval or military forces of Great Britain or her allies.

AND WHEREAS the Municipal Council of the said Town of Georgetown deems that it is desirable that the Town of Georgetown should erect a memorial in commemoration of said officers and men.

AND WHEREAS for the purpose aforesaid it will be necessary to issue debentures of the said municipality for the sum of Eight thousand dollars, the proceeds of the said debentures to be applied for the purpose of erecting and placing said memorial and to no other.

AND WHEREAS it is desirable to issue the said debentures at one time and make the principal of said debentures payable by yearly sums during the period of ten years, being the currency of the said debentures, said yearly sums being of such respective amounts that the amount payable in each year for principal and interest in respect of the said debentures shall be equal to the amount payable in each of the other years of the said periods as is hereinafter mentioned.

THEREFORE the Municipal Council of the Town of Georgetown enacts as follows: That for the purpose mentioned in the preamble there shall be borrowed on the credit of the Corporation of Georgetown the sum of Eight thousand dollars and debentures shall be issued therefor on the instalment plan in sums not less than one hundred dollars each, payable in the manner and for the amounts and at the times set forth in paragraph hereof.

That the said debentures shall all bear interest at the rate of six per cent, per annum having coupons attached for payment of interest, and shall all bear the same date and shall be issued within two years after the date on which this by-law is passed and may bear any date within such period of two years and shall be payable at the Bank of Montreal, Georgetown, Ontario, within ten years next after the date that they shall be issued and the respective amounts payable in each of said years shall be as follows:

That for the purpose of paying the said instalments of principal and interest as the same fall due respectively during the said ten years being the currency of the said debentures there shall be levied and raised in each year by a special rate sufficient therefor on all the rateable property in the said municipality the sum of \$1068.94 at the same time and in the same manner as the annual general rates.

Each of the said debentures shall be signed by the Mayor of the Town of Georgetown or by some other person authorized by law of the said Municipality to sign the same, and shall also be signed by the Treasurer.

The Clerk of the said Municipality shall affix the corporate seal thereto. The Coupons shall be signed by the Treasurer whose signature may be stamped, lithographed or engraved thereon.

FINALLY passed by the affirmative vote of three-fourths of the members of the Council, this day of 1922.

TAKE NOTICE that the foregoing is a true copy of a proposed By-law of the Corporation of Georgetown to be submitted to the vote of the electors on the 1st day of January, 1923, between the hours of 9 o'clock a.m. and 5 p.m. at the different polling subdivisions and that the 1st day of January, 1923, at 5 p.m., at the Town Hall has been fixed for the appointment of persons to attend at the said polling place and at the final summing up of the votes by the Clerk.

And that if the assent of the electors is obtained to the said proposed By-law it will be taken into consideration by the Council on the 15th day of January, 1923. The first publication of this notice was made on the 18th day of December, 1922.
