Obituary

DICK

After an illness of two months,
Catherine McGill, wife of Mr.
Richard Dick, of Toronto, died on
Saturday evening, Dec. 23rd, at
the home of her daughter, Mrs.
P. M. Fisher, Esqueving township,
with whom she was visiting. Mrs.
Dick was born in Erin township
seventy-six years ago, on the farm
where Mr. Archibald McGill, the
only surviving member of the fam-
ily, still resides. In 1869 she mar-
ried Richard Dick and for several
years after their marriage they
lived in Caledon and then moved
to Ashgrove, where they made
their home until three years ago
when they retired to 57 Ashburn-
ham Road, Toronto. Mrs. Dick is
survived by her husband, four
sons, David and Charles of Cleve-
land, Peter of Norval, and Clayton
of Ashgrove, and two daughters,
Mrs. Peter M. Fisher of Esqueving
and Mrs. Geo. A. Kennedy of
Horbury. The family held many re-
unions, the last being held on
Sept. 2nd, 1932, at the old home
in Ashgrove, when all were pre-
sent, including the grandchildren.
Had Mrs. Dick lived until Feb. 17,
she and her husband would have
celebrated their fifty-fourth wed-
ding anniversary. They were a

Notes and Comments

THE ONTARIO LEGISLATURE
will meet on January 23rd. The
session will be the last of the
present parliament, the four year
term of the Drury government
having then been completed. The
second session of the Dominion
Parliament under Premier King
will begin January 31st.

THE ONTARIO GOVERNMENT is
preparing legislation for introduc-
tion at the next session, the object
of which is to make land titles
absolute after
