Motor License Fees 1928

Announcement is made of the fees for motor licenses for 1928, as follows, divided into 4, 6 and 8 to 12 cylinder classes: 25 h.p. or less, \$18; 15 and 20: 25 to 35 h.p., \$18; 35 and 40: 35 to 50 h.p., \$30; 50 and 55: more than 55 h.p., \$50, \$35 and \$40. Electric driven motor car, \$15. Motor trucks of 2 tons or less, \$18; 2 to 3 tons, \$6 per ton; 3 to 10 tons, \$7.50; over 10 tons, \$10 per ton.
