## Notes and Comments

**SLANDER IN THE CURSE OF SOCIETY.** Many women who had about and are ready to faint, at a word a little off color, will fear to sully the reputation of a man or woman for the dedication of their soulless hearers, and actually make believe they are God-fearing people.

**A VERY NICE LADY** told us the other day that we did not publish everything that happened. We should say we don't. In the first place we have others, who depend on us for a living. If we published all that happened we should soon be with the angels. In order to please people we must print only the nice things about them and leave the rest to the gossips. Yet, it is a fact, we don't print all the news. If we did, wouldn't it make spicy reading? But this would be for one week only. The next there would be a strange face in heaven.

**ALL OVER ONTARIO** the press is reporting a realization on the part of the people and their representatives of the need of putting a stop to any further large expenditures until it is possible to ascertain just where the public is at in this matter. Debenture indebtedness have grown enormously in every municipality, and while a great deal of it was imperatively necessary in order to cope with the conditions, there is now a feeling that it is time a halt was called. Georgetown stands up well in comparison with other municipalities in the matter of civic debt, but even here it is possible to go too far. It is a good sign that the situation is becoming appreciated, because there was the danger of continuing the spending habit until it got too late. By electing in with the municipalities the economical habit may be impressed upon the Dominion Government, which added over \$49,000,000 to the national debt last year and is continuing monthly to increase the same.

**CHURCH FINANCIAL REPORTS** are a good barometer of the times, for if money is tight and unemployment rife it does not take long for the church reports to reflect such a condition. Judged on that basis the splendid financial statements presented by the churches of this and other towns lately reflect a very pleasing state of affairs, for in nearly every instance they show greater revenue than a year ago. A very healthy state of affairs is thus revealed. It is equally gratifying to realize that, notwithstanding a feeling often expressed to the effect that irreligion is growing there is no sign of such a reverse in any of the reports presented. The statistics of attendance do not indicate any particular falling off in church attendance, as, indeed, could be seen from the case when the contribution to the brick plant, Evidently, though the churches are assailed by constant criticism, they are proceeding along the even tenor of their ways, some of them more alive and energetic than ever, and with the churchgoers their adherents more possessed than ever with their responsibility as supporting the church. It is all a hopeful sign.

## Obituary

**ALFRED SMITHSON**  
A highly respected citizen of Eden district passed away on Friday, January 12th, in the person of Alfred Smithson who died at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Walter Townsend. Deceased was born at Salmonville, Ont., Nov. 29th, 1861, and came to Manitoba about 30 years ago. With the exception of eight years spent in Saskatchewan, he has lived continuously in the Eden district engaged in farming up to the time of his death. Mr. Smithson's wife died 22 years ago on the 8th of January and since that time he has resided alone most of the time. He is survived by a family of three daughters and a son, also his aged mother who lives at Eden; and who celebrated her 97th birthday on Christmas Day.

The daughters are: Mrs. W. Townsend of Neepawa, Mrs. R. W. Chisholm of Brookdale and Miss Eva Smithson of Toronto. The son is Wellington Smithson of Neepawa. Two sisters, Mrs. Emma Elviss, Neepawa and Mrs. D. Townsend, Eden, and two brothers, William of Eden and Joseph of Binscote, also survive him. All were present at the funeral except Miss Eva of Toronto. Deceased was a retiring disposition and generous nature, and had been ill just four months with heart trouble. He was able to converse with those around him up to a few moments before the end.

The funeral was held on Sunday last, conducted by Rev. Dr. Cooke. Interment took place in Riverside cemetery.—Neepawa Press, Manitoba.

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**Ontario Motor League**  
With every pair of 1923 motor makers distributed throughout the Province of Ontario, the Ontario Safety League is sending a letter of warning to motorists. The letter, which is under the heading "The Red Trail of the Automobile," is to the following effect: "Automobile accidents in Ontario increased about 30 per cent. in 1922, in comparison with 1921. Hundreds of persons have been killed unnecessarily. These people died needlessly. Do not take a chance.  
"Save your children from being killed or crippled by automobiles. Teach them to be careful by being careful yourself. Look both ways before crossing a street. Do not cut corners; use the crossings. Do not hurry. Protect your children by teaching them these things.  
"Drive slowly where children play. Streets are the only playgrounds many children have. Make their playgrounds safe. Children are easily confused. Give them the right of way. Make this an invariable rule. Do not force children to take a chance.  
"When you are walking, use the street crossings. Keep your eyes open. Wait for the traffic signals. Make haste slowly. Never take a chance.  
"When driving an automobile, drive carefully—do not speed. Examine your brakes frequently. Do not trust the other fellow. Give trains the right of way.  
"Lose a minute and save a life."
