Inspector's Report

The Chairman and Members of Georgetown P.S. Board, Ladies and Gentlemen—

On completion of my official visits to your school for the present term I take the earliest opportunity of submitting my report, regretting that on account of pressure of time this term it is late in being forwarded. It has again been a pleasure to find the school so well organized and so ably conducted. It is a great source of satisfaction to me, as it must be to you, that your very competent staff has remained intact another year. The discipline of the school is excellent, and the pupils show a very wholesome respect for their principal and teachers and a very commendable willingness to cooperate in the efforts made for their advancement, all of which testifies to the ability and discretion of the staff. The enrollment stands at 989, a decrease this year of six. The necessity of an additional teacher this school year was obviated only by a very large class passed on to the High School at midsummer. The success of all 46 candidates at the Junior H. S. Entrance examination in June, with 16 taking honor standing and one of them leading, all the candidates in the county is a record seldom surpassed by any school, indeed is one rarely equalled, and reflects the highest credit upon your principal as well of course as upon the pupils themselves. Congratulations are due all concerned in this achievement.

I appreciate the progressive action of the Board in providing the suggested improvements in the equipment and accommodations of the school. With the furnishing of Miss McDonald's room with single seating there remains only Mrs. Robertson's room to be supplied. I trust this provision will be made next year. I also note the completion of the redecoration of the interior of the school at midsummer.

With this report I complete ten years in the supervision of your school. Permit me therefore in concluding this brief report to again express to you my sincere appreciation of the high standard of proficiency that has been steadily maintained, the marked ability with which you have been served by your present principal, Mr. Green, in every detail of the management of the school, and the public-spirited attitude of the Board in making all necessary provision for the school in keeping it to the fore. I am quite safe in saying that in all the essential features of a successful Public School yours is not excelled by any school of similar size in the Province.

Highways

At the meeting of the county council last week it was decided to send a deputation to wait on the Minister of Highways to ask that the second line of Trafalgar and 'Equus' from Beattie to the town line between Beattie and 'Equus' be made a county provincial highway. Another proposed request to the Minister discussed at a meeting held at Oakville last Saturday, that the government take over the Toronto-Hamilton highway as a provincial highway. Those who attended the meeting were Reeve Morden, W. E. Davidson, New Toronto M. J. Bräpikon, Nelson W. E. Basher, Brook Peter Bay, East Elmhurst, W. A. Irving, Nelson G. Ethier, Reeve of Oakville, W. N. Robinson, deputy Reeve, Jas. Waddell, Trafalgar, M. J. Hennessy, Milton, W. and all the members of the East Elmhurst council. Several other requests were presented through illness. The Highway Commission was condemned by speakers and its chairman pronounced the most antipathetic in the country. The highway was pronounced too narrow and it was suggested that the government be asked to widen it. Reeve Morden and Warden Irving thought the government should take over the road, and pay 60 per cent of its cost. The meeting passed a resolution that the government be asked to take over the highway as a government road. The resolution was moved by W. H. Heatbrook, Warden of West-worth county, and seconded by W. A. Irving, Warden of Halton county. Similar resolutions will be passed by the municipal councils and a deputation will wait on the government at the earliest possible date to ask it to comply with their wishes. A resolution was framed by Deputy Reeve Robinson which will be passed by all municipalities interested, making the same request. An appointment with the government will be made, and a big deputation will go to Toronto to press the claims of the municipalities.—Champion.
