THE SUMMER FALLOW

Not So Good as Cultivation and Soil Improvement. Good Occasionally for the Destruction of Weeds and Insect Pests—Stick to One Breed in Breeding Live Stock is Fatal to Success.

There is no soil so rich that it can stand the long continued practice of summer fallowing without decline in fertility. Experiments have shown that when summer fallowing is practiced, the times when nitrogen is released, soil moisture and phosphorus are lost.
