**Local Council of Women**

On Friday, March 10, the Provincial Council of Women met at Sherbourne House Club, Toronto. Mrs. Matthew and Miss Dayfoot attended from Georgetown.

Dr. Augustus Stowe Gullen presided and in her address reminded the Committee that the National Council of Women is not political, non-sectarian, embraces all women's activities, and is a purely reform organization, and referred to some of the important measures which have been brought about by their efforts, such as the Mothers' Allowances Act, and Dental and medical inspection of schools.

The main business of the morning was the organization of this Provincial Council into a Provincial Council, which will have a number of advantages, especially facilitating arrangements for deputations to the Government.

All of those present were guests of Dr. Gullen at luncheon, the guest of honor being Mrs. Carmichael of New Glasgow, N. S., the National President, who gave the luncheon address. She referred especially to the need of conservation of our natural resources and the need of internationalism and the support of the League of Nations, of whose work and accomplishments we have little idea.

During the afternoon a number of matters were taken up, one which demands special attention, being that of the feeble-minded, of whom there are 50,000 to 65,000 in Ontario alone. A case was instanced of four sisters who married and lived in different states, whose progeny when traced numbered 1208, of whom only about 100 were normal—1150 being feeble-minded, or criminal, or both. No provision is made for the feeble-minded in Ontario except at one institute at Orillia which accommodates about 1000, these only very extreme cases—the other thousands are at large. It is stated that 25% to 45% of criminals are mentally deficient and 60 to 75% of the occupants of our reformatories are of this class. Still more serious is the fact that 50 to 75% of known prostitutes are feeble-minded and a great menace everywhere in broadcasting venereal disease.

The Government will again be asked by the Provincial Committee for legislation to deal with this question, for a system of segregation with limited freedom where possible and suitable occupations, making as many as possible an asset to the province instead of an increasing liability.

It will be composed of Acton, Georgetown, Burlington, Campbellville, Bronte and Milton. Officers elected were: President, J. F. Joyce, Bronte; 1st Vice-President, E. McWhirter, Georgetown; and Vice-President, C. Toleska, Milton; Secretary Treasurer A. O. Flumerfelt, Bronte. The executive will consist of the officers and two representatives from each club. The league will again affiliate with the O. B. A. and each club will send a delegate to its convention to be held at Toronto on April 7th.
