Home Burned to Ground

On Sunday last about 1 o'clock the house of Mr. A. Hancock at his farm near Norval Station was discovered to be on fire. The flames spread very rapidly and in a short time the house and entire contents were completely consumed. Much sympathy is felt for Mr. and Mrs. Hancock and their family in their heavy loss. The origin of the fire is unknown.

Two Awarded \$500 and Costs

Justice Sir William Mullock presided at the Peel Assizes Wednesday. The case of Algio vs. Hunter and Cameron was stated out of court, defendants paying plaintiff \$500 for injuries received by Lockie Algio when he collided with defendants' car on Main street last fall.

Miss Mary Fitzpatrick was awarded \$500, plaintiff claiming damages for injuries received when struck by James Wilson's car in Caledon East. The jury deliberated for several hours on this case after hearing 12 witnesses.

Memories of the Past

The death of Samuel Dolson of Oshingououy, mentioned in the HERALD a few weeks ago, reminds friend of the Cornwall Freehold that in his boyhood days they were a clerk in his father's store in Georgetown named Charles Dolson, probably a brother of the deceased, who went to Portland, Oregon, in the late fifties or early sixties, when Oregon was further away in time than China or India now a days. Possibly some of the old-timers will remember Charles Dolson. The late S. F. Mackinnon of Toronto was with Mr. Young about the same time or later.

Fire at Acton

The Acton fire brigade was called upon for the first time this year, when "Fairview-Place" the large, stone house owned by Mrs. Sidney A. Smith, caught fire about 10 o'clock Saturday morning. The fire originated in the attic, supposedly caused by defective electric wiring, and owing to a high wind prevailing the flames spread rapidly through the entire upper story. The firemen were unable to get a good water pressure until a frozen valve at the reservoir was thawed out. Regardless of all handicaps and with the aid of bystanders, the brigade saved most of the contents and preserved the first story of the building. The loss is estimated at about \$15,000 and is partly covered by insurance.
