**Masons Attend Church**

Splendid Sermon by Rev. Percival Mayes—Special Music Contributed

Worshipful Master S. Kirk, Officers and a large number of the brethren of Credit Lodge A.P. & A.M. attended divine service at St. Georges Church on Sunday evening last.

The beautiful service of the Anglican Church was finely rendered by the large choir, the unaccompanied parts being specially well sung. Mrs. Annandale presided at the organ and a violin solo was given by Mrs. Jack Thompson, Mr. W. F. Bradley being in charge of the choir.

Preaching from Acts 1, verse 7, the Rev. P. Mayes traced the history of Masonry from the earliest times, Egyptian mysticism and Greek philosophy to prehistoric masonry showing that its roots lie deep in the past. He referred to the building of the temple and influence of John the Baptist through the sect of the Essenes upon the development of its masonry and the subsequent spreading of the art throughout the Roman Empire by travelling Freemasons. The church in England and Scotland was very closely identified with masonry from the time of St. Alban, the Norman Conquest and the Crusades playing a part in the development of the Craft, and how in the revival of masonry as the beginning of the eighteenth century the preservation of its technical language was continued. He emphasized the value of truth and brotherly love and the immense work and influence for good of the Masonic order throughout the world.

On their return to the lodge room a very hearty and unanimous vote of thanks was tendered to Rev. Mr. Mayes for his able and inspiring address.

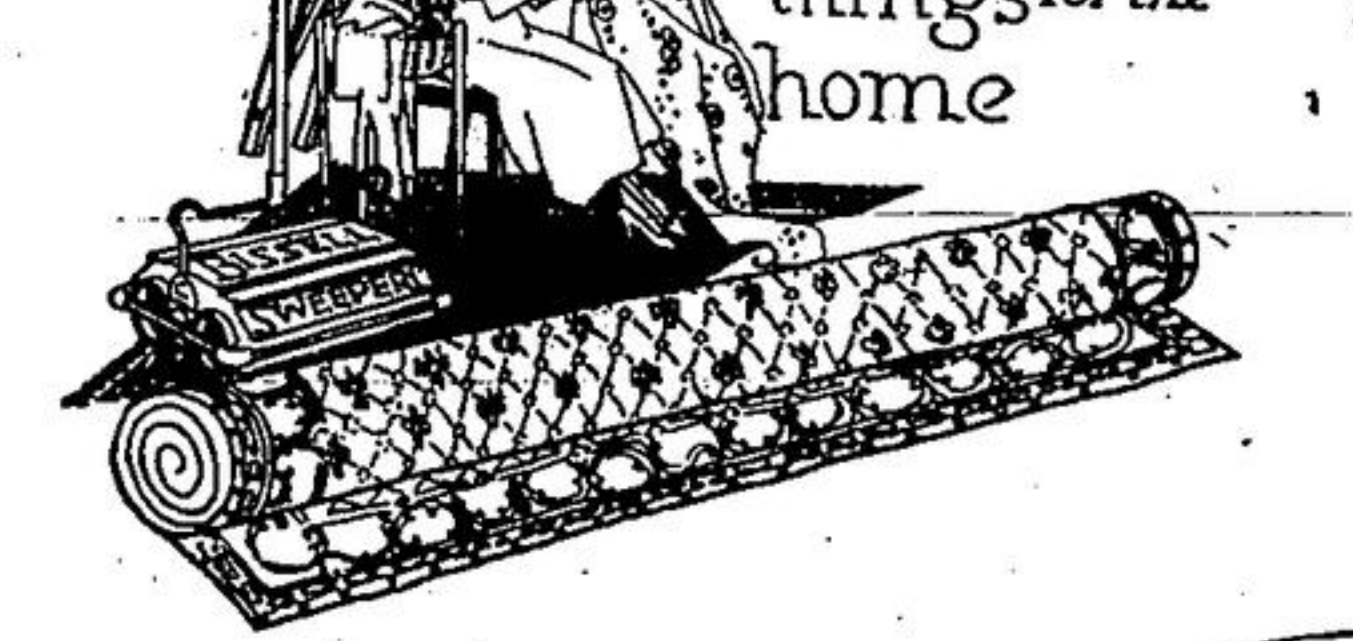
