**Obituary:**

REV. ROBERT DAVY.

After a short illness the death occurred last week of Rev. Robert Davy at his residence, 490 King Street east, Hamilton. Deceased was born in Limerick, Corkshire, Ireland, 70 years ago and had an education at the Royal School of Hamilton for three or four years.

He was a member of the Methodist and official board of Elizabeth Street Methodist Church. Rev. Mr. Davy was ordained into the Methodist ministry in the year of his marriage, 1872, at Montreal; by the late Rev. Morley Penrose.

He had served a total of 27 years before superannuating about 17 years ago. Mr. Davy was a former pastor of Georgetown church.

On Tuesday, June 27th of last year, Mr. and Mrs. Davy celebrated the golden anniversary of their wedding. Besides his widow, four sons, T. J. W. Davy, Dr. J. Davy, Mr. G. Davy, and G. R. Davy, the two daughters, Mrs. W. B. Bitchie of Hamilton, and Mrs. W. Bitchie in England, survive.
