AFTER OCTOBER 1 the use of postage stamps on cheques, receipts, etc., will be prohibited. The change is due to a desire to find out just what the postal revenue is and the revenue from the tax on cheques and other such papers. The Post Office Department has also opened up an office for the philatelists and old and current issues of Canadian stamps are now purchasable at Ottawa.

WHILE IT IS POSSIBLY quite true that every possible precaution against fire is being taken by the management of Muskoka hotel resorts, the lesson of the Muskoka fire horror is that additional safeguards are necessary in the interests of the general public. The Legislature of Ontario, acting upon a fire marshal's report, which does not doubt make recommendations looking towards the elimination of hazards at summer resorts of every kind, should take prompt action so that whatever additional precautions against fire and protection of guests in all hotels or frame construction, may be deemed advisable, are made compulsory at once. Eight or nine lives were lost in the Wawa hotel fire; there might easily have been several more. No precaution that can be devised should be neglected at such places, and it is the duty of experts to point out what such safeguards shall be.

JAMES GIFFEN
On July 28th, there passed away on the 8th line of Sunnisdale, a much respected resident in the person of Mr. James Giffen, in his 71st year. Mr. Giffen was born in Chingussoway Township in March, 1852. In 1882 he came to Sunnisdale and purchased the farm he has lived on till his death. Bank Depositors May Escape Loss

Although the announcement of the suspension of the Home Bank of Canada has come as a severe blow to the thousands of depositors in Canada, strong hope is felt that when the assets are realized upon to the fullest extent, though probably at the cost of a levy in part at least upon shareholders under the double liability provision, persons whose money has been deposited with the bank will be indemnified to some extent against loss. The curator, Mr. A. B. Barker, announced on Saturday that all bills of the Home Bank would be accepted at par at any other banking institution, thereby relieving any anxiety among unduly timid holders. So far the depositors are concerned they are likely to obtain a percentage of their money within ninety days. The period for which operations of the Home Bank have been suspended, while other payments will likely be forthcoming as the progress of liquidation progresses.

General News

Sir William Meredith, since 1913 Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of Ontario, died at 10.15 last night at the Royal Victoria Hospital, Montreal, following an illness of about a week's duration. Sir William, who was in his 84th year, succumbed to an acute intestinal malady brought on by a chill he suffered last week while bathing in the sea at Scarborough Beach, Maine. On request of the chairman of Brampton Old Home Week Committee, T. W. Doggan, the Council will assume the deficit of \$700 shown in the accounts presented by A. H. Milner, rather than allow a few guarantors to assume the entire amount. Yesterday while motorists in the west end of Milton County were driving towards Moffat they were astonished to see standing in a field about 50 yards on the right side of the road an exceptionally large buck deer. As the motorist nearly stepped their car, however, the deer disappeared.

A unique band programme will be at the Canadian National Exhibition. In addition to the leading Canadian and United States bands to be at the Big Fair, there will also be an artillery band from Cuba, which is coming up by war ship, and the personal band of President Obregon of Mexico.

Russell Harnsworth has been awarded the contract for installing the heating plant in the Peel Memorial Hospital at Brampton, at a cost of \$4,000. Every effort is being made by the Board of Governors of the hospital to have the hospital ready by Armistice Day, when the opening will take place. Ratepayers of Bolton are expressing their strong appreciation of the economy of the Village Council, as a result of a reduction in the rate, which has been reduced from 40 to 35 mills. The School Board requires \$5,000 this year for general purposes.

During the last few days there has been a rush on the Department of Mines to stake gold claims in the section of Stag Bay, between the Big Brook and Black Duck Rivers. Fifty locations have been filed the last couple of days. The rush is consequent on a report that the gold strikes have been made in this region.

Information for Sportsmen

Changes in the regulations under the Migratory Birds Convention Act affording the shooting of migratory game birds in certain provinces have recently been authorized by Order in Council. Under the Order a further class of season throughout the Dominion has been provided for Wood Duck, extending until January 31, 1924. A similar closed season has been provided for Eider Ducks, except that Eider may be shot in the Yukon and Northwest Territories during the regular open season provided for ducks in those localities.

The open seasons provided by the Regulations under the Migratory Birds Convention Act for the season 1923-24 for Ontario and Quebec are as follows:—

Ducks, Geese, Brant and Rails. In Quebec: September 1 to December 14, both dates inclusive. In Ontario: September 1 to December 15, both dates inclusive. Shorebirds or Waders, including only the following: Woodcock, Wilson or Jack Snipe, Black-bellied and Golden Plover and Greater and Lesser Yellowlegs. In Quebec: September 1 to December 14, both dates inclusive. In Ontario: September 1 to December 15, both dates inclusive, except that on Woodcock the open season shall be from September 15 to October 15, both dates inclusive.
