THERE WAS A TIME when a person who rode a bicycle on the sidewalk in Georgetown was prosecuted, and we believe there is a by-law to protect pedestrians on the walks of our town at the present time that is ignored by cyclists and not enforced by the authorities. Last week a six-year-old lad in College View was run down by a cyclist on the sidewalk and received severe and painful bruises. It was fortunate some of his limbs were not broken. If an example were made of some of the cyclists who persist in riding the walks and endangering the lives of citizens we have no doubt the practice would stop. If it is allowed to continue some one will be seriously injured and then the Corporation may be the defendant in an action for damages. The roadway is the place for cyclists, not the sidewalks.

Amalgamation of Banks

Bank of Commerce Acquires Assets and Liabilities of Bank of Hamilton

The Bank of Hamilton, after carrying on business in Canada for fifty-one years, is to pass out of existence. The Minister of Finance, Rt. Hon. W. B. Fielding, announced last night that the Canadian Bank of Commerce will take over the assets and liabilities of the Bank of Hamilton.

That the amalgamation was not altogether unexpected was borne out in a statement by one of the leading financiers in Toronto. He explained that a large number of banks have been carrying heavy commercial accounts in Winnipeg and western Canada generally, and these have been especially heavy with the jobbers and wholesalers. These firms have been supporting the retailers and when business in the western provinces failed to recover up to expectations because the farmers were holding back, the wholesalers and jobbers were hit, and several were required to suspend operations and many went out of business. When the farmers did commence to meet their obligations, they only met them in part and attributed their financial difficulties to low prices for their products. This situation created a feeling of uncertainty throughout western Canada and the banks suffered considerably as a result.

Until the amalgamation as approved by the minister of finance is given official sanction by the governor general, George Loyns' branch is still the Bank of Hamilton.
