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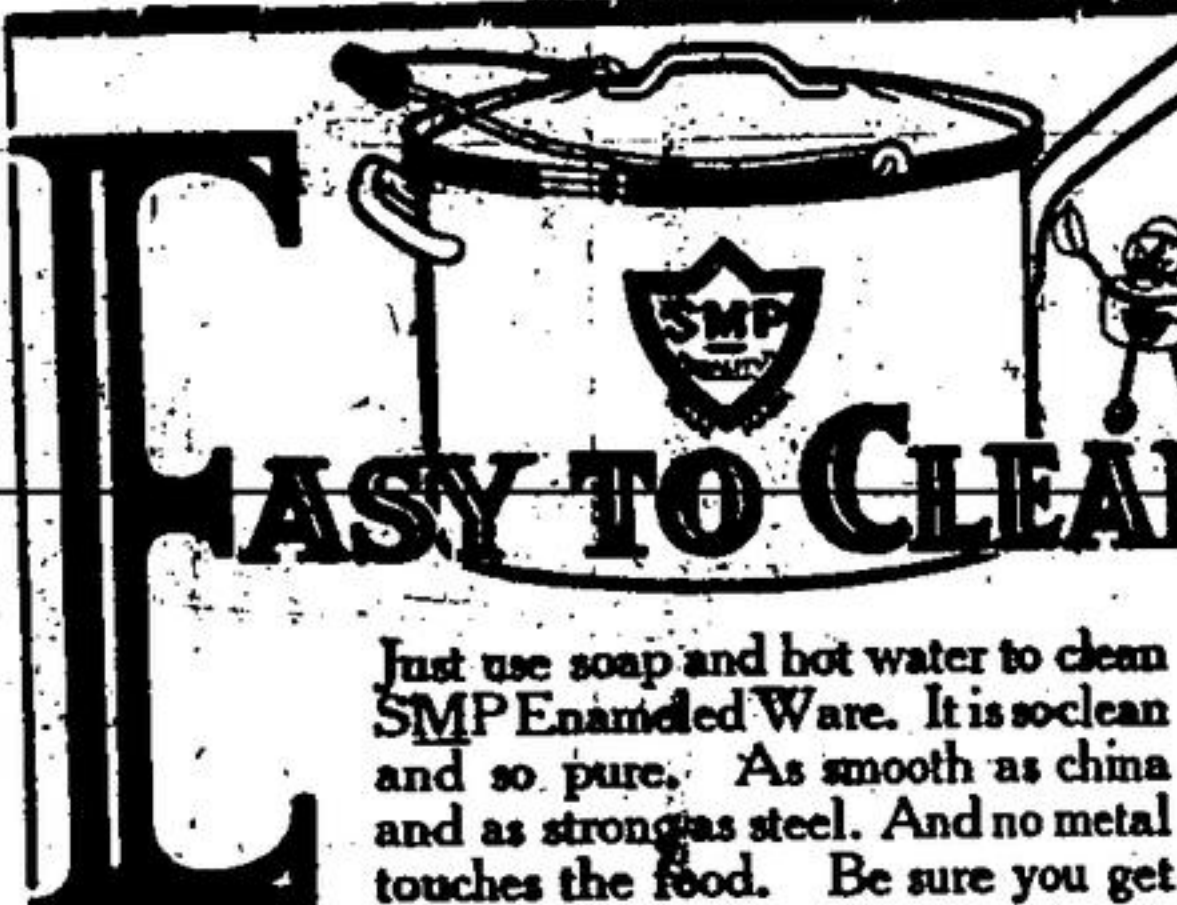

### Esqueving Son in Russia

The following interesting inter-

view with Sir Donald Mann, on

his return from Russia, to London

England, was given to a Star cor-

respondent last Saturday:

"I've not done any business in

Russia," Sir Donald Mann said.

"I went there hoping I might do

business, but haven't done any.

Whether any future business will

arise out of my trip, I cannot say.

I travelled 2,500 miles in Russia

and found the railways in good

shape. Roadbeds were excellent.

Train service was not very fast,

but it was punctual. Sleeping

cars are quite as good as you get

anywhere on the continent. From

Moscow to Petrograd is 400 miles

and we made it in twenty hours.

I also went by train down to the

Black Sea ports. The service was

very fair, the average speed of pas-

senger trains being 27 to 45 miles

an hour. The Star asked what

the prospects were for Russia's

economic recoverer. Sir Donald

Mann's reply, uttered with char-

acteristic deliberateness, was sur-

prising.

"It is quite possible," he said,

"that Russia will be the first Eu-

ropean country engaged in the great

war to make a real recovery. It

is a wonderfully rich country. I

travelled by train about a thousand

miles through grain fields

mostly sown with wheat. This

country is just as fertile as the

Canadian Northwest. There is a

fair crop throughout Russia this

year. In the north it has been

very wet, and much grain has

been lost. In the south it was

beautiful harvest weather.

Wheat was all cut by the

middle of
