Farm Hand Killed at Threshing

Groff Jones, aged 30, of Hazard's Corners, lost his life in a peculiar fire which started in a threshing machine on the farm of Robert Broad, four miles north east of Madoo village. Jones was taking straw from the blower when suddenly from the funnel of the blower came a ball of fire, which fell in the straw not far from him. A workman near at hand made an effort to prevent it from spreading but only succeeded in it. The workman ran out of the barn for safety, and not for a little while was it known that Jones was alive, until he staggered all ablaze, out of the barn, which had by that time caught fire. The barn was burned with all the crops. The origin of the fire is not known, but it is thought it might have been caused by a strand of straw collecting about a shaft and igniting from friction.
