### Morrison Avoids Mention of Drury

J. J. Morrison, Provincial U.F.O. Secretary, addressed the well attended meeting of the Canmill (U.F.O.) in the Capilla Hall, about 8 miles north of Orangeville on the 26th inst. In the course of a ninety-minute speech the U.F.O. Secretary did not mention any Premier Drury or the recent Provincial election. He avoided any reference to party politics or the policy of the new Government at Toronto, devoting himself in the main to an exposition and explanation of the principles and constitution of the United Farmers' organization.

Mr. Morrison told his hearers that they had little to expect in the way of assistance from manufacturers or other interests. The tillers of the soil would have to work out their own salvation, and the only way they could do so was by co-operation and a better understanding among themselves.

Orr, and the granddaughter of the late Josiah Boyce, for many years an esteemed resident of Acton, and previously of Framosa.—Free Press.

### A Two-Day's Fair

Rather than disappoint a large number of exhibitors who found it impossible to get to Brampton through the heavy rain last Friday, the Board of Directors of the County of Peel Agricultural Society decided Monday to hold a two-day's fair on Friday and Saturday, October 19 and 20, instead of October 4, as first announced.

**Potato Crop Competition**  
The winners of the potato field crop competitions held under the auspices of the Nelson and Burlington Agricultural Society, were judged by Mr. Chamberlain of St. Catharines on Friday last and the prizes awarded as follows:—Thos. **Barber Home Burned**  
The old Barber home, a mile and a quarter below Streetville, occupied by Mr. and Mrs. W. Fletcher, Port Credit, and erected 70 years ago, was totally destroyed by fire early last Friday morning. The house was valued at \$14,000, and the furniture at \$5,000, part of which is covered by insurance.

**Angle Parking**  
Most cities and towns are adopting the angle system of parking for automobiles—many have by laws making this method compulsory. In view of the cars being strung out in rows along the curb, the cars are parked in an angle position which not only takes much less room but the auto can be backed out at any time without disturbing any other cars in the row.

**The Seeds Bill**  
An Order-in-Council has been issued bringing into effect on October 1st the bill respecting the testing, inspection and the sale of seeds, which was passed last session. The bill has to do with the grading and specification of grades of seeds placed on the market. Thus, it seeds prove not up to specified quality, the purchaser can get redress. An important provision of the legislation has to do with keeping grass and clover seed free from seeds of noxious weeds. It is provided that the seed, package shall bear the name and address of the merchant, as well as the province and county in which the seed was grown. The bill also provided for the registration, through the Canadian Council of Horticulture, of newly discovered varieties of agricultural or garden vegetable seeds or plants.

**"PATRONIZE HOME INDUSTRIES"**

There are always a number of people in every locality who are known as "knockers," who seem to take pride in telling of the weakness of their home town and sounding the praises of other places. There are others who also are not good to the community, those who purchase all their goods in the city or other towns, because they imagine they get better and cheaper goods than they get at home. They should remember that the merchants in their own town help to keep up their schools and churches, as well as contributing the cost of maintaining their roads, and other utilities.

**Barn Burned in Peel**  
Fire caused by an electric storm on Friday afternoon and which broke out again on Saturday, in the barn on the estate of the late George Gray, Mayfield, now occupied by Wilfred and Aubrey Gray, caused the destruction of barn and stables, the season's grain, pigs, fow and implements, with a heavy loss.

**Merger Approved**  
The partnership of the directors of the Bank of Hamilton last week a resolution was passed approving of the amalgamation with the Bank of Commerce on a share for share basis. This follows the action taken by the Bank of Commerce directors on Friday last. A meeting of the shareholders of the Bank of Hamilton to ratify the amalgamation has been called for November 19. The Bank of Commerce shareholders will meet on November 21 for the same purpose.

**Ex-Heave of Caledon Dead**  
James Davidson, ex-heave of Caledon Township, and one of its councillors for many years, died on Friday, Sept. 28th, at the home of his son, Thomas A. Toronto, after a brief illness. He was born 75 years ago on lot 3, third line west, Caledon, where he spent his life until 18 years ago, removing to the village of Inglewood and going to the city a year ago. He was prominent in the Baptist Church, Cheltenham, and was a Liberal in politics. His wife, formerly Miss Lizzie McArthur, died years ago, and two sons and a daughter.
