written to his father, the first
Secretary, Treasurer of the Society

1847.

Hamilton, Feb. 10th, 1853.
Richard Tracy Esq.,
Treas. Esqueusing Agr. Society.
Dear Sir: Enclosed you have a
cheque for twenty one pounds
11 10 say 21 pounds, 11 shillings,
10 pence being with 35 pounds re-
mitted in October the amount to
be paid to the Esqueusing Agricul-
tural Society by the Counties
Society for the year 1852. I could
not have answered your last letter
in time for your meeting and I
only had my bank book made up
on Friday last, otherwise I should
have sent the enclosed before.
Our annual meeting has been this
day postponed to the 23rd instant,
by which time I hope to receive
your report. I remain,
