Auto is Captured With Burglars' Haul

About 2 o'clock Sunday morning George Buck, who lives in the South Ward at Milton, was returning home from the residence of his father, John Buck, who lives on Main Street, when he was held up on east Mary Street at the rear corner by a man dressed in a flashlight and a revolver, and ordered to go back where he came from. Buck did so and telephoned Constable Chapman. A man hunt was started and in a motor car near Clement's garage on Martin Street there was found a man alleged to be the one who held up George Buck. A revolver was found in the car beside the suspect who was arrested. The car was discovered to be loaded with dry goods, clothing and furs tallying with the description of the goods stolen from the general store of C. S. Ewing at Fergus on Friday night.

Mr. Ewing arrived in Milton on Monday morning and identified the dry goods as his. The arrested man, who gave his name as James Albert Chadwick, aged 37, of Spruceville, was taken back to Fergus. It is believed the arrested man and two companions planned to rob stores in Milton. They had left their boots in the car, and probably were wearing creepers or woolen soled shoes.

The other men are believed to be still hiding in Milton, and a posse is on the watch for them.
