The first Oddfellows' Lodge was
installed in Georgetown on March
2nd 1857, in the basement of the
Brampton Oddfellows' Lodge,
Golden Star, No. 101. The Grand

Wright of Toronto and the Grand
Secretary was J. P. King of Tor-
onto. The lodge on this occasion
the following officers were in-
stalled: J. O. Campbell, Henry

Foe, R. D. McMaster and A. C.
Alston. Owing to a fire in 1892
the minutes and records were de-
stroyed, but the original charter
has been preserved.

The magnificent building in
which the Lodge Rooms are located
contains one of the finest arenas
and curling rinks in Western On-
tario. The hockey rink which was
in use part of last season, has an
ice surface of 75 feet by 175 feet
and seating capacity for nearly
two thousand people. The building
contains all modern conveniences
and the spacious waiting rooms and
lodge rooms are heated by steam.

The Lodge Officers and members
of the Arena Board of Directors
went to congratulate on the very
splendid climax to their splendid
effort, both to provide lodge rooms
and a modern place of recreation
for our citizens and the company
during the long winter months.

A sad feature of the dedication
is the recent death of the Noble
Grand of Orion Lodge, the late H.
H. Heartwell, who gave much time
and energy to the movement.

The completed structure cost in
the neighborhood of \$50,000, and
the Board have still about \$5,000
worth of stock which they would
like to dispose of. The shares are
only \$25 each and we would like
to see every citizen take a share in
this splendid winter playhouse of
the community. Be a philantropist

**National Council
Executive Meeting**

(Continued from page 1)
The plan of rural settlement of
Mr. Algar-Bailey came in for some
discussion and favorable comment.
This scheme calls for the estab-
lishment of small villages about
community centres in our western
provinces to render more enjoy-
able the lives, particularly of the
women, in these remote sections.
At Thursday luncheon the con-
oil and many friends had the great
pleasure and honor to bear the
world famous suffragette, Mrs.
Emmette Pankhurst, on the sub-
ject of social hygiene. None were
disappointed but all have now
Mrs. Pankhurst as we've greater
admiration than formerly.

In answer to a communication
from the international president,
Lady Aberdeen, it was decided to
participate in the British Empire
Exhibition. A special pamphlet
from Canada will be prepared for
distribution.

A short session of the Provincial
executive was held, Mrs. A. P.
Troydale, ex-warden of Niagara
Falls, occupying the chair, in the
absence through illness of Dr.
Shaw Collins. In the matter of
the creating of a ministry of
health, the council heartily sup-
ported the action as it was thought
it would strengthen efforts put
forth in the interests of child wel-
fare and public health.

Another resolution decided on
was that of urging all local coun-
cils to support by resolution, and
deputation if necessary, the efforts
of the town planning commission
in various centres to secure a
town planning law for the provin-
ce, viz:—

Another matter dealt with was
the question of children of un-
married parents. The council de-
cided to urge on the province the
care of the mentally deficient un-
married mother.

The matter of changing the date
of municipal elections from the 1st
Monday in January to the 1st
Monday in December was dealt
with and received hearty support
in that it would enable many to
take an active interest in munici-
pal matters, who, otherwise, by
reason of the season of the year,
would not be able to do so. This
plan has been carried out most
successfully in Niagara Falls, Lon-
don, Kingston and many other
cities and towns, and the citizens
ship committees of local councils
are requested to lay this matter
before their municipal councils.

On Thursday evening a large
audience with Mrs. Troydale pre-
siding had the pleasure of hearing
Mr. E. T. Richardson of Ottawa,
general secretary of the League of
Nations in Canada, speak on the
work of the League, and Miss
Mary Poyer from the Public
Health and Nursing Service of On-
tario speak on her department of
work in the province.

On Wednesday evening a very
pleasant At Home was held at the
beautiful and hospitable home of
Mrs. H. P. Lawson where many
arrived themselves of the oppor-
tunity and pleasure of meeting the
council's guests.

At the close of the general
meetings a hearty vote of thanks
was extended to the many Geor-
getown housewives who did so much
to help make the Convention pleas-
ant, successful and long to be re-
membered.
